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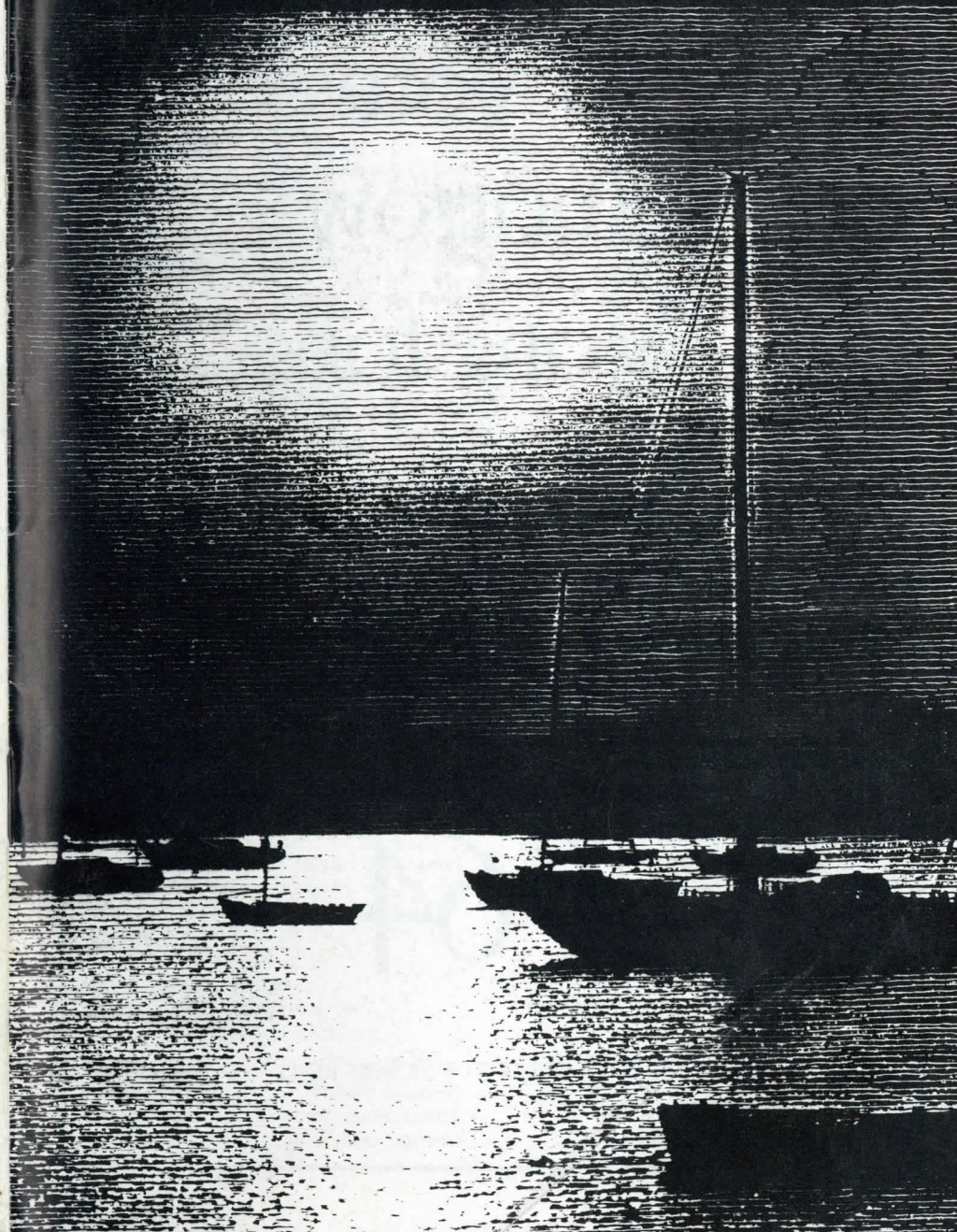

Tomorrow is election day in New Orleans — an important day.

Around the Clock, in its issue two weeks ago, endorsed Morris Reed for the office of District Attorney. We urged you to cast your vote for him in tomorrow's election.

We repeat that message today.

Around the Clock has also reported the endorsements of the New Orleans Regional Chapter of LAGPAC (NORCO/LAGPAC).

LAGPAC endorses candidates only on the basis of their positions on gay issues. Prior to the endorsement process, teams of LAGPAC members interview every candidate who is willing to participate. After the interviews, the Executive Committee meets, discusses all of the candidates, and prepares recommendations for the membership. A general meeting of the membership is

then called, at which the members vote on whether to endorse in any particular race, and, if so, which candidate to endorse. A two-thirds majority of those voting is required to endorse.

In tomorrow's election, NORCO/LAGPAC has endorsed the following candidates:

Lindy Boggs, #10, U.S. House of Representatives, 2nd District; Ronald J. Harris, #43, Civil District Court, Div. 1; Sheila C. Myers, #50, Criminal District Court, Section B; Morris Reed, #64, District Attorney, Orleans Parish; Richard Ducote, #72, Juvenile Court, Section C; and Gail Moore Glapion, #83, Orleans Parish School Board.

The polls open tomorrow at 6 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m.

Around the Clock urges you to vote. The results of these elections will affect your lives. ♦

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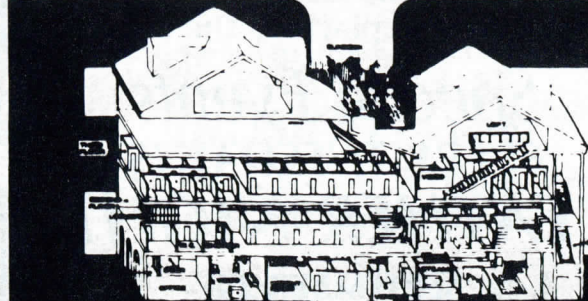
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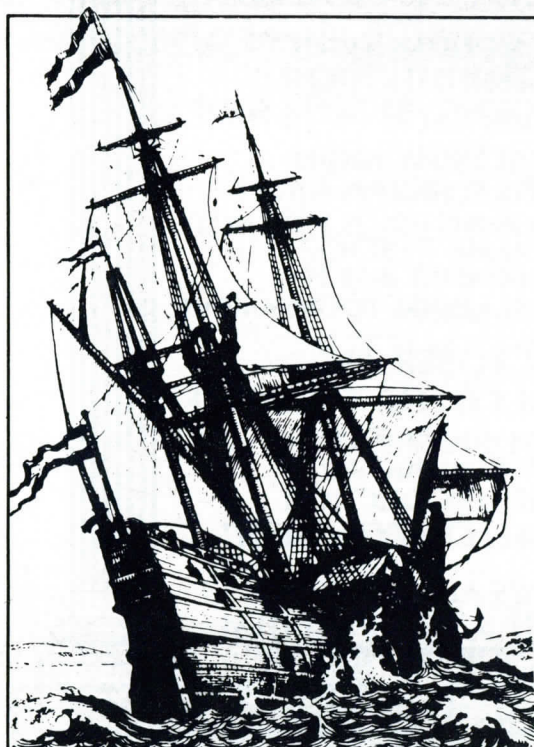
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BARTENDERS HONORED IN DALLAS

The Roundup's Tom Davis was honored Best Manager, while Mike Hildebrand, also of the Roundup, was declared to be Best Barback.

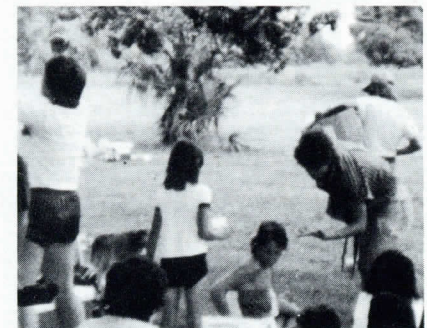
The awards are part of the end of the summer festivities of the Guild, which includes a rummage sale and a parade. ♦

More than 200 people turned out for the annual event, which is used to help fund Gay Fest activities, and is also sponsored by six bars and clubs.

Participants turned out for events



ranging from an all day volleyball tournament, to a purse toss, a girdle hurdle, and a cross dressing event called the "Grab Drag."

According to organizers, entry fees and monies raised from other sales are enough to insure a small profit, which will be used to set up Gay Fest '85, which will be held sometime in June 1985. ♦

Held mostly for travel agents and others in the hospitality industry, the reception was to show off the newly renovated 1848 Creole cottage which now has some 14 bedrooms, a patio, and lots of amenities.

Rooms at the New Orleans Guest House range from \$50 to \$85 a night and have been available since Labor Day. ♦

NEW AIDS CANCER FOUND

Researchers have discovered a second cancer which has been linked to AIDS, according to the *Boston Globe*.

A fast growing lymphoma, which often is found in transplant patients whose immunity system can't ward off infections, has also been found in pre-AIDS and AIDS patients.

More than 90 cases of the lymphoma have been found after surveys in San

Francisco, Los Angeles, Houston and New York, and more are suspected.

So far more than 6,000 people have been stricken with AIDS with more than 2,400 deaths. Over 4,200 of these are gay males. ♦

RAID ON BLACK BAR TERMED "WHITEWASH" BY POLICE REPORT

An internal police report on a raid in September, 1982 by New York Police on "Blue's," a predominately black bar in midtown Manhattan which resulted in 12 injuries, but no arrests, has been termed a "whitewash."

A 12-page report on the raid was released by the police department, while it was announced that the District Attorney and the FBI had dropped their investigations for lack of evidence.

According to witnesses everyone was lined up against a wall when police entered. Anyone who turned around was beaten. Because everyone was facing the wall and officers turned down the lights, it was hard to identify particular officers.

Two Sergeants in charge of the raid were disciplined. One of them only was punished, losing 15 days vacation time. ♦

INDIANAPOLIS GAYS WIN VICTORY OVER POLICE SPYING, HARASSMENT

After several weeks of gathering in a popular downtown Indianapolis, Indiana square to protest police spying and harassment, gays and lesbians have won a major victory when that city's mayor stated that anti-gay discrimination "will not be tolerated."

Gays and lesbians began gathering every Friday evening since late July in Memorial Square near several popular Indianapolis gay bars to protest against police use of closed circuit cameras and harassment by officers in the area.

Just before the start of a planned major rally, Indianapolis Mayor William Hundt reversed himself and offered to conduct meetings with members of the gay and lesbian community, a proposal

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he had turned down earlier.

Hundut said in a statement, according to the *Boston Gay Community News* that "the door is open."

The protests were considered novel in that very conservative Midwestern city. There were up to 1,000 gays and lesbians gathering each Friday night on the square to socialize and protest police actions.

Indianapolis vice officers had justified the video taping as a means of controlling prostitution and "child pornographers," even though they are very near several large gay discos and a bathhouse. ♦

MORE THAN 2,000 TURN OUT FOR DALLAS TAVERN CARNIVAL

More than 2,000 people turned out the weekend of September 15th and 16th for the annual Dallas Tavern Guild's Carnival held in Dallas in the parking lot of the 4001 Club, at 4001 Cedar Springs.

An annual affair of the Guild, the event, along with the annual parade which was held the following weekend on Sunday, September 23, is seen as the finale to Dallas' gay pride celebrations.

Member bars of the Guild turned out and helped stage events with three of the most favorite being "Dunk Your Favorite 4001 Employee"; "Test your Strength"; and the Hideaway, 4144 Beuna Vista brought in a baby grand for their event which they called "Piano Pent."

Other bars participating included J.R.'s, 3923 Cedar Springs; The Throckmorton Mining Company, 3014 Throckmorton; The Roundup, 3914 Cedar Springs; The Hidden Door, 5025 Bowser; and The Tarrant County Mining Company, 735 N. Collins in Arlington, as well as other members of the Guild and the Dallas Gay Alliance and the Dallas Gay Symphony.

Food and other goodies were available, with the Hideaway also providing Sno-balls. A special event which allowed patrons to get even with others was called "Hideaway's Hit Man." He

would hurl a gooey ice ball at the unsuspecting victim.

The parade started at Lee Park and came down Cedar Springs disbanding at the parking lot of the 4001 Club. Member bars and other organizations sponsored floats in what has become another annual event of the Dallas gay community. ♦

BANGOR SCHOOLS FIGHT HOMOPHOBIA

School officials in Bangor, Maine have instituted policies to fight homophobia after hatred of gays and lesbians was blamed in part for the death of a gay male, Charles Howard, who drowned after being thrown from a bridge by several school students.

The new policies call for banning discrimination because of sexual orientation; supporting reprimands for those who are intolerant of gays and lesbians; and establishing workshops for dealing with intolerance, including homophobia.

Francis Baines, 15, Shawn Mabry, 16, and Daniel Ness, 17, have been charged in the death of Howard.

The three will be tried in adult court, though the exact charges have not been established. ♦

REFERENDUM BACK ON BALLOT IN MARYLAND

A referendum to repeal the Montgomery County Maryland human rights ordinance, which had earlier been thrown out by elections officials, will be held, a judge in Maryland has ruled.

Circuit Court Judge John J. Mitchell ordered the Board of Elections Supervisors to stage the referendum on petitions by a group calling itself "Citizens For A Decent Government" (CDG.)

CDG had filed petitions to remove all language affecting gays and lesbians from the county's anti-discrimination ordinance.

The Board of Elections Supervisors had ruled that since the county's charter prohibits amending laws and only calls for repealing them, that the petitions were invalid. ♦

Scott Baio will not make it with *Charles in Charge*. If he couldn't make it with

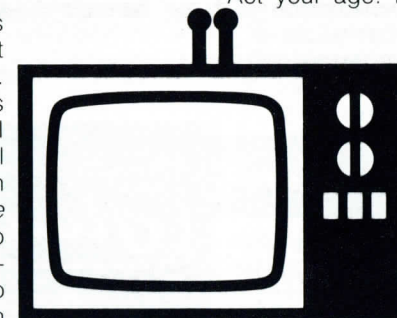
Joanie, he won't make it here. Here's a prime example of being a contract star and having the network try to find something for you to appear in.

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
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
