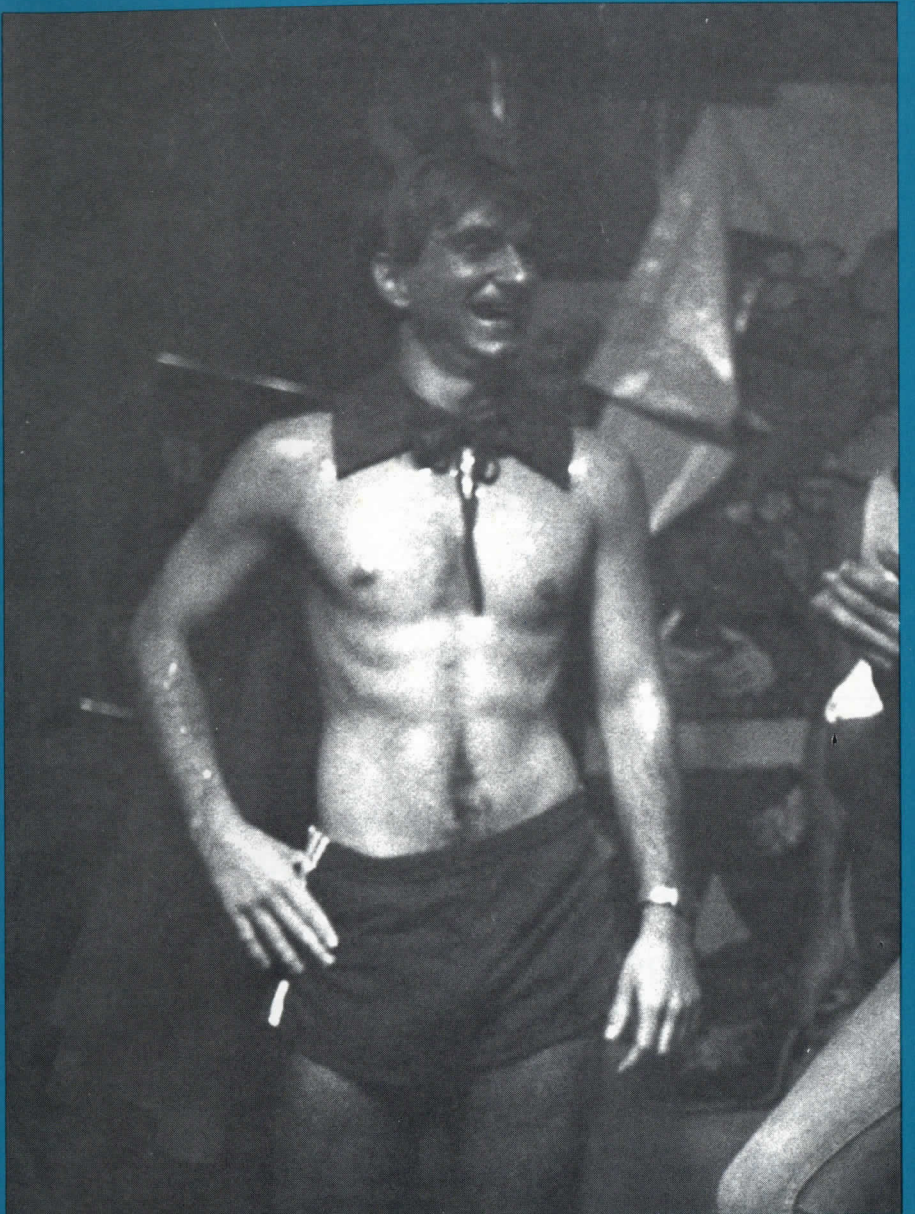

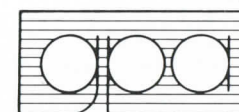

DO WE HAVE LOWER EXPECTATIONS?

Last week some copies of *Around the Clock* were distributed which looked like hell. We apologize to any of our readers who picked up one of those copies.

Our printer had somehow gotten some makeready sheets (those sheets that go through the press first to establish position and ink coverage) into the bindery department (where the magazines are assembled).

The result was that our phones started ringing — just about everyone who picked up one of "those" copies called to let us know about it. We at *Around the Clock* appreciate those calls. It is physically impossible for us to inspect each copy of the magazine before it is shipped to our many distribution points, so your calls keep us informed about screw-ups that do slip through occasionally.

The attitude of a few of our callers, however, disturbed us a little:

"Well, what can you expect from a gay publication?"

"It's what I'd expect from a gay-owned business."

"Can't faggots do anything right?"

Those comments set us to thinking. Do we really expect less from a business because it is owned and operated by gay people? Are we really still buying the bigoted line of thought implying that, since we are something less than human, we could not possibly achieve standards in our work, our lifestyles, that the "normal folk" do?

And as a related issue, do we expect less from non-gay businesses because we are a gay customer?

It seems that the answer to that question, in some minds at least (too many for our liking), is YES.

All too often, we "make allowances" for businesses, organizations and individuals — because they are gay . . . or because we are!

In making those allowances, *we repress ourselves*. We diminish our horizons. We lower our sights. We put ourselves down.

We at *Around the Clock* believe that the overwhelming majority of gay businesses, (continued on page 25)

NEW GAY COMPLEX OPENS

A major new gay entertainment complex held its grand opening on Friday night.

Hits had already opened its doors at the old Lucky Pierre's location at 735 Bourbon Street.

Outside the bar-entertainment complex looks just like the restaurant which stood there for many years, but inside major changes have been made.

Hits co-owner, Buddy Arnold, pointed out that one of the major changes is the enclosed patio where a multi-level dance floor area has been installed.

With neon lights and video the dance floor will offer "disco with an outdoor feeling," Arnold said.

The carriageway will have games and a pool table.

There is another bar inside on the first floor, a "quiet place to meet your friends and talk," Arnold added.

Upstairs is a restaurant offering dishes leaning to Italian and Creole cuisine with a somewhat *nouveau* flavor.

Meals will be in the medium price range with two specials a day.

"It is time that the gay community here got a place like this," Arnold concluded. ♦

GAYS SHOULD JOIN OTHERS LIVING ON THE FRINGE

Gays and lesbians are just one of many groups living on the fringe of society, and they should join with other groups to make their lot better, participants at the Dignity Region VI Conference were told. The conference was held in New Orleans October 20th and 21st.

The meeting of the gay Catholic organization, which included gays and lesbians from Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma, was held at De La Salle High School in uptown New Orleans. Several speakers stressed the need to join with other disadvantaged groups to form effective coalitions. ♦

GAY FATHER AWARDED CUSTODY

A gay man whose son was kidnapped by his fundamentalist ex-wife, because she believes homosexuality is a sin, has been awarded custody of his son by a California court.

Superior Court Judge Judith McConnell

in San Diego upheld a 1982 order giving the Palm Springs man custody of 13-year-old Brian Batey.

The mother will stand trial for contempt of court after taking the son for 19 months and moving out of state before being found. ♦

JUDGE CLOSES BATHHOUSES

A San Francisco judge has issued a temporary injunction ordering the owners of nine bathhouses and sex clubs, who had ignored a health department order, to close.

Judge William Mullins issued the injunction at the request of the city after the nine clubs decided to ignore an order by Dr. Mervyn Silverman that all bathhouse and sex clubs close, because of fear over the spread of the killer AIDS.

Mullins termed the bathhouses, "a real public health menace," and said the injunction would remain in effect until a later hearing to determine whether it should be made permanent, according to a report in the *Boston Gay Community News*.

Attorneys for the bathhouse owners and the Northern California Bath Owners Association protested the judges order, with one lawyer saying that the judge was prejudicial as he received over 600 pages of information at 10 a.m. and made his ruling at 2 p.m. the same day.

The attorneys for the bath owners association have filed an appeal on the judge's order.

GAY LOSES ADOPTION BID

A bid by a 54 year old man to legally adopt his lover of 25 years failed when the New York State Court of Appeals refused to overturn a lower court's ruling against the adoption, according to *The New York Times*.

The 4-2 decision was based on the fact that the parent in this relationship has had "sexual intimacy" which is "repugnant to the relationship between child and parent in our society," the majority decision, written by Judge Matthew J. Jason, said.

The opinion continued, "adoption is not a means of obtaining a legal status for a non-marital sexual relationship, whether homosexual or heterosexual."

A statement submitted by the two men said they considered themselves a family, though this might not be in the traditional sense. They sought adoption for financial, economic and practical reasons as well as emotional ones. ♦

DRIVE UNDERWAY TO SHOW DEUKMAJIAN NEED FOR GAY EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS LAW

A drive has been launched to gather evidence of discrimination against gays and lesbians in employment, to show California Gov. George Deukmajian the need for a state law protecting gays and lesbians in the workplace.

Deukmajian recently signed a bill allowing gays and lesbians who are the victims of violence to sue their attackers, after being given evidence of the need for the bill.

Last spring the governor vetoed Assembly Bill 1, citing as his reason that he was unaware of the need for the bill.

According to a report in *The Advocate*, State Rep. Art Agnos and State Senate President Pro-Tem David Roberti have established a clearinghouse for information on discrimination against gays and lesbians in the workplace.

Agnos, who was the author of the Assembly Bill, promised he will reintroduce the bill on December 3 when the legislature reconvenes. He is hopeful that, with the evidence which is being sent to the clearinghouse, Deukmajian will sign the bill if it is passed. ♦

MILITARY RECRUITERS ALLOWED IN CALIFORNIA SCHOOLS DESPITE GAY BAN

The President of the University of California has ordered that military recruiters be allowed on the campuses of the University of California and UCLA law schools, despite the military's discrimination against gays and lesbians in uniform.

President David Gardner made the decision after faculties at both schools voted to ban the recruiters for not allowing gays and lesbians to serve in the armed forces.

The California Board of Regents in 1983 unanimously voted to prohibit discrimination against gays and lesbians, and the

faculty said the military's refusal to allow openly gay and lesbian people to serve in the armed forces violated this policy.

But Gardner ruled that the military's refusal to allow gays and lesbians in uniform did not constitute a violation of the Board of Regents policy. ♦

PSYCHOLOGIST OUSTED AFTER ANTI-GAY REMARKS

A Lincoln, Nebraska psychologist who said that gays should be registered for spreading AIDS and was also quoted as saying that anyone engaging in gay sex should be jailed until certified they aren't carrying disease, has been dropped from membership in the American Psychological Association, *The Washington Blade* reports.

The APA said in a letter to members that Paul Cameron was being dropped from membership for "gross distortion and misrepresentation of scientific literature in public statements."

In an appearance before the Lincoln City Council which was debating a gay rights measure, Cameron likened homosexuality to "a dog's taste for blood after killing its first victim."

He also added that 33 to 45 percent of the cases of child molestation involved homosexual contact. That statement is not supported by scientific research.

Six faculty members from the University of Nebraska complained to the APA after Cameron's Lincoln appearance and the psychologists' group made its decision on the complaint.

The Lincoln gay rights measure failed, in large part due to Cameron's testimony. ♦

THEATRE DIRECTOR SENTENCED

The director of the nationally acclaimed Minneapolis Children's Theatre has been sentenced to a year in the Hennipen County Workhouse and 15 years' probation for having sex with three 15-year-old boys.

John Clark Donahue, 46, pled guilty to the charges. Under terms of the sentence, Donahue will not be able to have anything to do with the theatre or children and will undergo psychiatric counseling.

Donahue was arrested on April 18 after parents of one of the boys complained to police.

Under Minnesota law Donahue could have been sentenced to life in prison, but as a first offender, he received the lighter sentence. ♦

REHEARING ASKED IN TEXAS SODOMY DECISION

A Texas District Attorney has petitioned the entire 11-member Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans to overturn an order dismissing the appeal of a lower court ruling which invalidated Texas' sodomy statute.

Potter County District Attorney, Danny Hill, is asking the entire appeals panel to overturn the decision of a three-judge panel dismissing the appeal because Hill did not have a direct bearing in the case.

The appeal was over the decision of a U.S. judge in Dallas in the case known as *Baker vs. Wade*.

When Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox decided not to appeal the case, a group calling itself Dallas Doctors Against AIDS together with other anti-gay groups got Hill, D.A. in a small Texas county, to appeal to the Fifth District, which hears cases from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Hill is confident he will get the rehearing. If not, he told the *Boston Community News*, he is prepared to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. ♦

TEXAS A&M TO FIGHT GAY RECOGNITION ORDER

Texas A&M will appeal a ruling by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals which ordered the University to recognize a gay student group.

According to a report in *The Montrose Voice*, the university was given the go-ahead to appeal the decision to the U.S. Supreme Court by Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox.

Mattox will not appeal the case, but will allow the university to hire its own attorney.

Gay Student Services filed suit in 1976 when the university refused to recognize them, thus keeping the group from using school facilities.

Officials at the school, which has a largely military course of instruction, said that the gay group's goals were inconsistent with the philosophy of the school.

The university student senate has gone

on record as recommending that the group be recognized. ♦

HUMAN RIGHTS CAMPAIGN FUND ANNOUNCES NEW CO-CHAIRS

Vic Basile, Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) announced the election of Duke Comegys and Vivian Shapiro as co-chairs of the Campaign Fund's Board of Directors October 10th.

The HRCF is a political action committee that assists congressional candidates who are committed to the support of gay and lesbian civil rights.

The organization plays a vital role in working on behalf of all citizens, particularly lesbians and gay men, to promote human rights and individual freedom.

Mr. Comegys, from Los Angeles, is a fundraiser for many gay and charitable causes and an investor and art collector.

He is also vice president of the Board of the Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center of Los Angeles.

Ms. Shapiro was a fundraiser for Chuck Hitchcock, the first openly gay candidate to run for Congress from New York's First Congressional District, and for New York City Councilman David Rothenberg.

A supporter of the National Gay Task Force, she is vice president of an advertising agency in New York City. ♦

NURSING HOME REFUSES AIDS PATIENTS

Nursing homes in the Louisville, Kentucky area are refusing to accept AIDS patients because of fear of catching the disease, *Lambda Louisville* reports.

There are two AIDS patients in Kentucky who require hospital or nursing home care, but attempts in the Louisville and southern Indiana area to get care for them has been thwarted.

In a related development, a labor union has been cleared of charges that it counseled members to strike rather than serve AIDS patients.

Federal investigators found that the American Federation of Government Employees did not tell members to strike or call in sick when having to deal with AIDS patients.

The union did counsel caution for those who deal with AIDS patients filing social security claims because they can't work

GAYS, ARTISTS, FEMINISTS PROTEST CENSORS

More than 200 gays, feminists and artists gathered in Toronto (Canada) recently to protest a meeting of censors from seven countries including the United States.

The Artists Union gathered the anti-censorship demonstrations, in which they linked opposition to censorship with the struggle to change the dominant forms of representation of women and sex in society.

Recently censors in Canada and Great Britain have seized magazines from the United States for being obscene.

The seized include *Mandate* and other magazines which are readily available from newsstands in this country. ♦

GAY RIGHTS WINS ONE, LOSES ONE, ON HOLD IN ANOTHER

A gay rights measure was defeated in Duluth, Minnesota. In Baltimore, Maryland another is on hold, while the Cambridge, Mass. City Council approved a similar measure after two years of trying.

Duluth voters defeated that city's human rights measure by a 3-to-1 margin in a referendum called by a group of fundamentalist Christians calling themselves Citizens Through Decency Laws (CTDL).

The measure was passed earlier this summer over their veto of Duluth Mayor John Fedo.

Shortly thereafter the CTDL was formed and started getting signatures on petitions to call the referendum.

The final result was 20,768 to 6,654 according to a report in *The Boston Gay Community News*.

Gay activists were upset as they expected the margin to be closer, and they blamed the loss on homophobic advertisements which smeared gays as "spreaders of disease."

In Baltimore, Maryland, gay activists will again try to get City Council Bill #187 passed after the council amendments watered it down to allow discrimination against employees who advocate homosexuality.

The measure, which has been before the Council since early this summer, has

not been passed while pressure from fundamentalist groups has tried to either kill it, or weaken it through amendments.

In Cambridge, Massachusetts the City Council, by a 6-to-3 margin, passed a human rights ordinance which creates an 11-member Human Rights Commission to monitor enforcement of the city's human rights laws, which include protection for gays and lesbians.

The measure was the result of more than four months of behind-the-scenes work by gay activists and members of the City Council. ♦

GAYS 7TH LARGEST BLOC OF VOTERS

Gays and lesbians make up the seventh largest bloc of voters in the United States, a July 16 report in *U.S. News and World Report* states.

The weekly news magazine estimates that some 17 million voters call themselves gay or lesbian.

Women are the largest voting bloc with 91 million voters.

Other blocs include: Evangelical Christians, 40 million; youths between 18 and 24 years old, 29 million; those over 65 or the elderly, 28.2 million; blacks, 19 million; and union members, 18 million.

The magazine used the Kinsey Report estimate of gays and lesbians making up 10 percent of the population to come up with their estimate.

Gays and lesbians as voting blocs are ahead of Hispanic Americans, Asian American; Jews and farmers in numbers of voters. ♦

HORMONES MAY INDICATE BIOLOGICAL DIFFERENCES IN GAYS

Researchers have found evidence that gay men and straight men may be different because of biological differences in their hormones, according to an Associated Press report.

Scientists at the State University of New York at Stony Brook have found that the hormone response of gay men to stimulation by other hormones fell between those of straight men and women, their report in the magazine *Science* shows.

The study showed the difference in nine out of 14 gay men.

In the study, using heterosexual women

as the control group, the women and a group of gay and straight men were injected with a single injection of estrogen.

The scientists then studied the reaction of all the groups.

In all the groups the injection lowered leutenizing hormone levels, but within 24 hours the levels began to rise.

The fastest rise was seen in the women, while the slowest in the straight men. The gay men were somewhere in between.

D. Brian Gladue, head of the research team, stated this was not a cause of homosexuality, but simply showed that there might be a physiological basis for homosexuality in some men. ♦

ANTI-GAY REFERENDUM KILLED IN MARYLAND

The Maryland Supreme Court has apparently killed for good an attempt to have provisions of the Montgomery County Human Rights Ordinance as they pertain to gays and lesbians, put on the November 6 ballot, the *Boston Gay Community News* reports.

The court ruled in a challenge to a lower court order, which forced the Washington D.C. suburb to place a referendum seeking to strip language protecting gays and lesbians from discrimination from the county's human rights law.

The Montgomery County Council passed the amendments to the ordinance in February, including sexual orientation with the classes protected by law.

Almost immediately a group calling itself Citizens for Decent Government (CDG) began gathering signatures on a petition to force the amendments on the ballot.

CDG gathered 26,000 signatures, more than enough to force the election, but the Montgomery County Board of Election Supervisors ruled that the petitions were invalid, as they sought only to amend, rather than repeal the ordinance, as was required in the county's charter.

CDG obtained a lower court ruling forcing the election to be held November 6, which set up the appeal by the county and local gay rights groups.

The ruling by the highest court in the state effectively killed this petition drive. ♦

MCC LOSES PRISON WORKSHOP BID

The Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) can be denied the use of facilities for holding religious services inside prisons, the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati has ruled.

The appeals panel turned down a bid by Jackson City, Michigan prisoners to allow MCC services inside prison. MCC has been allowed visitation and mail privileges in the prison, but never the right to hold services.

The court upheld a 1977 lower court decision that gay inmates worshipping together could be identified and victimized by fellow prisoners. ♦

500 MARCH IN INTERNATIONAL DEMONSTRATION

About 500 gays and lesbians marched on the United Nations September 30th to show their support for International Gay and Lesbian Rights.

Organized by the Lesbian and Gay Organizing Committee, the march ended at the United Nations Plaza where the group's 11 demands were heard.

These include: freedom to live as gay and lesbians from youth to old age; an end to violence against gays and lesbians; the declassification of homosexuality as a disease by the World Health Organization; equal rights in housing and employment; the right to keep their own children; and quality health care for gays and lesbians. ♦

The headline said *Edge of Night* canceled! My heart sank. For 28 years this daytime serial has held millions of fans fascinated with its extremely involved plot machinations. *Edge* was a pioneer in character development and plotting for all the time it has been on the air. Many of its ploys have become standard with today's plethora of soaps... oops!, daytime serials.

Yet I cannot, in all honesty, shed a real tear for its passing. You see, I have not watched even *one* entire program in the entire period it's been around. I've probably watched a minute here and a couple of minutes there, but never a complete show. I always seem to twist the dial to something else.

Daytime serials, the soaps, bore me to tears! I guess I was conditioned this way since the pioneer "soaps" on radio such as *Our Gal Sunday*, *Portia Faces Life*, *One Man's Family* and *Ma Perkins*.

DOING AMERICA

DES MOINES

Des Moines is the capital and largest city in Iowa . . . the heartland of Mid-America.

This prairie metropolis is the industrial, financial and retailing center of the "Hawkeye" State, and is considered the insurance capital of the west.

The river which passes through the center of town was known to the local Fox and Sac Indians as the Moingonia. French explorers shortened it to "Moin" and it became "La riviere des Moines." The city of approximately 200,000 is pronounced Di-Moyn.

As midwestern capital cities go, the Des Moines bar scene is getting better . . . especially on weekends. Bars are open nightly until 2:00 a.m., but Iowa is 'dry' on Sundays.

The best disco is Our Place at 811 Walnut Street, and it does get some good looking young preppies. The Question at 208 W. 3rd St. also has a disco and attracts mostly women, but a few male hustlers also.

By the time this goes to press they plan to discontinue the restaurant and add a large screen video.

Directly next door is a small joint called the Carnival, which is nearly all lesbian.

The nearest thing to a western or leather cruise bar is the Barndoor at the corner of Court and W. 4th St. This is the home of the Cornhaulers, Iowa's only M.C., and gets the busiest daytime business.

It gets an interesting blend of businessmen in suits and young hustlers right off the farm . . . but don't ask me which farm. The nice fellows who run this, Rich and Bob, have also just opened La Cage at 416 E. Walnut, and by late summer plan the Holding Cell,



downstairs at the same location.

Several Des Moines book stores, such as the Bachelor's Library, Gallery and Court Street News offer 'action' back rooms.

Birdland Park, Greenwood Park and the "Gay Loop," Keo and Park, between 4th and 5th are outdoor cruising areas.

There are no gay restaurants in town, but some kids go to the One Twelve in West Des Moines or Denny's near the airport.

While this is not the culinary capital of the Midwest, pretty good straight dining can be found at Duck's & Company, Iowa Beef Steak House (where you can cook your own steak if you want), Julio's Mexican Restaurant, Old Market Spaghetti Works, the Pier and Raintree.

The current 'in spot' is Guido's at the newly remodeled old Savery Hotel. I stay at the Holiday Inn Capitol Plaza, but hear a lot of gay salesmen are staying at the relatively inexpensive Midtown Motor Inn just down 6th street.

Iowa's stately gold-leaf domed capitol stands in a park on top of a hill overlooking the surrounding city.

Des Moines' strikingly modern Civic Center also houses the city's ballet company and symphony orchestra.

Nearby Nallen Plaza features a water-

Annual events include the Drake Relays in April and the Iowa State Fair in mid-August.

For antique lovers, any day can be a field day at Valley Junction.

Reno is called the "Biggest little city in the world." Des Moines could be more accurately described as a 'little' big city. Except for the new Marriott and a couple of other new buildings, not much has changed here over the years.

New skywalks are going up between hotels and shopping centers as part of a downtown urban re-development project. This will eventually mean that the bars around west 3rd and 4th streets will have to relocate, probably on the east side of town.

It can be colder than hell here in the winter time, but is generally pretty nice the rest of the year.

Des Moines doesn't aspire to be a 'world class' city . . . but is as American as apple pie. If you are traveling through the midwest or Great Plains States, plan a stopover here. I think you will find as I do, the gay scene is not too shabby at all. ♦
