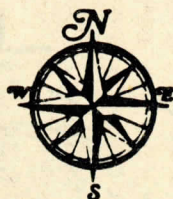

PLENTY OF FREE PARKING

As the dust settles at the Gay rights National Lobby from the resignation of executive director Steve Endean, more details surface as to the circumstances surrounding his resignation.

In a lengthy letter handed over to GRNL's board, October 15, in Chicago, Endean explained how the heavy barrage of criticism leveled at him by Larry and the Advocate hampered his effectiveness in continuing as executive director. The charges of incompetence weren't readily accepted by many observers, who cited what they thought was an apparent lack of concrete evidence. Nevertheless, Endean told the GPA that he was continually receiving

phone calls and letters from Advocate readers and others asking for explanations of his performance.

Some observers think it has been excellent. In the five years since Endean has held GRNL's top position, the organization has gone from a desk in someone else's office to a three story town house on Capitol Hill, from one employee to ten, and from a bank balance of \$9 to an annual income well over \$300,000. The active involvement in the political campaigns of friends, and the lobbying for sponsors of gay rights legislation has been especially effective. Recently Senator Ernest Hollings of South Carolina became the eighth co-sponsor of the Senate's lesbian and gay rights bill, and

Representative Mo Udall of Arizona, became the 73rd co-sponsor of the house version.

Among Endean's major achievements was the creation of the National Convention Project in 1980 which coordinated a nationwide plan to involve more open gay men and lesbians in both the Republican and Democratic conventions.

One mistake Endean probably did make, according to one source, was the letting go of David Goodstein's friend Jim Foster from his GRNL position. It had been speculated that Foster is probably Goodstein's candidate to replace Endean.

Commenting on the Endean resignation, Larry Bush said, "Endean unquestionably

put a focus on Washington that was not there before he arrived. His own drive was to build support for the federal gay rights bill. As more immediate needs emerged, such as AIDS, he was unable to reset his priorities. At the same time, the emergence of the gay community made it important for gay leaders to take the community into their confidence, and represent them.

Bush expressed concern for GRNL's present financial situation. he said they are currently \$55,000 in debt, owe \$12,000 in back payroll taxes, and are faced with having to lay off three people from the support staff. He also felt the most important agenda for GRNL right now should be lobbying for AIDS funding

Congressman to Announce Position on Gay Rights Bill

Wyche Fowler will announce his decision for or against joining 74 other House co-sponsors of the National Gay Civil Rights Bill at the November 30th meeting of the Atlanta Business and Professional Guild.

Fowler met recently with Cindy Wright, an Atlanta attorney and chair of the Community Action Committee of the AB&PG, and Frank Scheuren, president of First Tuesday Association, and discussed the Civil Rights Bill and other issues.

The Gay Civil Rights Bill now has a record 74 co-sponsors in the U.S. House and eight co-sponsors in the Senate. Congressman Jim Leach of Iowa agreed to be a co-sponsor this week, said Tanya Corman, national field director of the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL). Ms. Corman said GRNL is concentrating on getting the bill through the House, "which is much more receptive." Approximately 25% of the bill's co-sponsors are members of the Congressional Black Caucus. In fact, said

Corman, all but three Black Congresspersons have become co-sponsors of the Gay Civil Rights Bill.

"One of the ways of building support is getting co-sponsorship," Ms. Corman explained. "We also started a labor project two years ago," which paid off with "the

recent statement of support from the AFL-CIO." GRNL is also working closely with the leadership of the National Organization for Women (NOW).

GRNL is also lobbying the American Bar Association to pass a resolution in favor of gay civil rights legislation at its next convention. The ABA narrowly defeating the resolution this summer in Atlanta. Corman admits the Gay Civil Rights Bill could take several years to pass in Congress.

Harrassment in Park; GayCLU Investigates

John Howell of the Lesbian/Gay Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union of Georgia said a letter has been sent to Mayor Andrew Young and to all City Councilmembers on what he perceives as police harrasment in Piedmont Park.

The action was initially taken in response to no-parking signs recently erected in a traditional gay cruising zone near the Atlanta Botanical Gardens. The signs prohibit parking on the upper drive through the park on week days but allow it on Saturday and Sunday. A comprehensive plan for Piedmont Park intends to eventually eliminate cars completely from the park. However, a spokesman for "Friends of Piedmont Park" insists that the present situation is not part of their overall plan.

Howell is also investigating possible police harrasment in an incident in which one man was injured in the "Tree Trails" two weeks ago Sunday. Witnesses are asked to call John Howell.

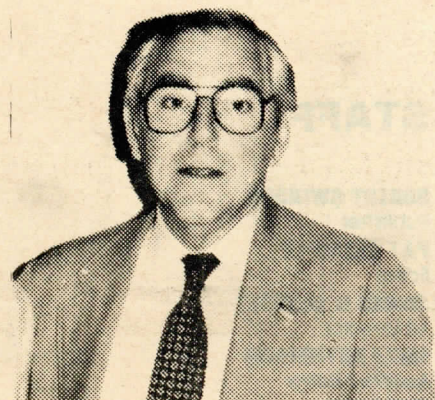
Public Safety Committee to Hold Hearings

The Public Safety Committee of the Atlanta City Council will consider two proposals having a significant impact on the gay community at a meeting at Atlanta City Hall Nov. 1. The public is invited to participate in the 7 p.m. meeting.

Public Safety will vote on a proposed transfer of \$10,000 in available city funds to AID Atlanta. Although the Finance Committee approved such a transfer, Buddy Fowlkes spoke out against it last week, saying the county and state should provide for funds rather than the city. At the last City Council meeting Fowlkes warned that approval of funding for AID Atlanta would open up a flood of requests from other non-profit health agencies. Representatives of AID Atlanta responded that the focus of their work is community education, not health care. Other Councilmembers did not express their views last week.

Ms. Davis and John Lewis are co-sponsors of a discrimination ordinance which the Public Safety Committee will also consider. The three-part discrimination ordinance addresses discriminatory admission practices, discriminatory membership requirements, and picture I.D. requirements at businesses which serve liquor.

In the words of Davis aide John Franklin "this should be a very interesting meeting."

Cancer Claims Sidney Marcus

Sidney J. Marcus, 55, a 14-year veteran state legislator and past candidate for Atlanta mayor, died at his home Thursday morning. Marcus was recently hospitalized with cancer but was sent home when his condition was diagnosed as terminal.

Marcus was neither flamboyant nor well-known until he challenged Andrew Young and Reginald Eaves in the 1981 mayoral election. His fellow legislators, however, credited Marcus with getting support for such projects as the World Congress Center, Grady Hospital funding, MARTA, Morehouse Medical School and funds for state pensions.

Marcus was praised for his ability to work both sides of the urban-rural street. "He could hunt with the hounds and run with the hares," said a former member of ex-Governor George Busbee's staff. Marcus will be remembered for openly campaigning in the gay community. "He became a good friend," said activist Frank Scheuren, who mustered up gay support for Marcus' campaign.

Marcus is survived by his wife, Charlotte, and three children.

Florida Dumps AIDS Patient On San Francisco

San Francisco (GPA) — Morgan MacDonald, a gay man with AIDS whose abrupt transfer from a Florida hospital to San Francisco touched off a bitter controversy, died Thursday at San Francisco General Hospital. He was 27.

City health director Dr. Mervyn Silverman said that MacDonald, who arrived here from Gainesville October 4, died at 9:45 a.m. (12:45 p.m. EDT) at the hospital's recently-opened AIDS ward.

"We are all saddened," Silverman told reporters, adding, however, that MacDonald had apparently been near death when he arrived in San Francisco after a chartered flight from Florida.

Shands Hospital, affiliated with the University of Florida at Gainesville, flew MacDonald by a private Lear jet "to make sure that he got the best possible treatment," according to hospital officials.

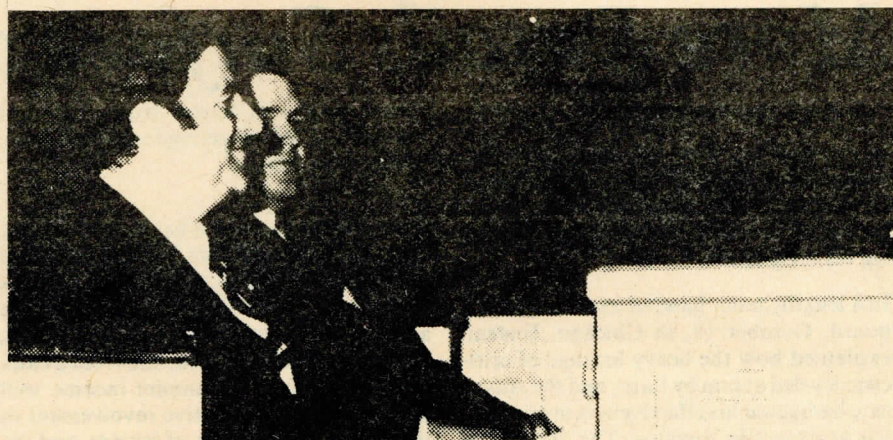
Silverman and San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein, however, accused Shands officials of "dumping" MacDonald here and, by doing so, committing a breach of medical ethics, with Feinstein branding it "outrageous and inhumane."

Silverman, who visited the patient Wednesday night at San Francisco General, described MacDonald at the time as being "barely able to talk . . . He was a shell of a man."

"It was clear from his condition when he arrived," Silverman continued, "and then it worsened, (and Silverman then knew) that he would not be leaving the hospital (alive)."

The mayor's press secretary, Thomas Eastham, contacted Florida Governor Robert Graham by telephone to inform him of MacDonald's death. Eastham also notified Graham that Silverman will send a medical assessment of the cost to Graham's office.

MacDonald was a resident of San Francisco, but was stricken with AIDS while visiting Florida.

Falwell Dies In Earthquake In LA's Practice Scenario

Although no one felt the giant tremor, calls were coming in to Los Angeles radio station KHJ for more details on October 11th, when the station began broadcasting the results of a simulated earthquake that hit the city at eight point three on the richter scale. The fictitious report was staged to test the preparedness of various government departments. What was unusual was the description of the damages.

Two catastrophe coordinators from the Department of Civil Defense and the Los Angeles Fire Department were on the air. They reported on the collapse of the four

level freeway exchange downtown, and the liquification of a large area round the L.A. marina.

Most startling was their report of an estimated 10,000 dead including the Reverend Jerry Falwell, who was supposedly addressing 2,000 members of the Moral Majority at the L.A. Convention Center when the roof collapsed killing everyone inside.

GPA was unable to find out who wrote the scenario, but it was discovered that the prepared script had passed through a number of the station's censors before airing.

A Challenge to Sodomy Laws in New York May Affect Decision on Similiar Case in GA

The case of Hardwick vs. Bowers, Slayton and Napper has received a stay from the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals, said Clint Sumrall of Georgians Opposed to Archaic Laws (GOAL).

Attorney in the case, which seeks a declaratory judgement against the Georgia Sodomy Statute, asked for the stay pending an expected decision by the United States Supreme Court on sodomy and loitering laws in New York. The New York Court of Appeals earlier this year struck

down as unconstitutional a law that made it a crime to loiter in a public place for the purpose of engaging or soliciting another person to engage in deviate sexual intercourse. The Erie County district attorney appealed the ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court. While the court may rule only on the loitering issue, both sides of the litigation feel it will also rule on consensual sodomy. "It could go either way," said Sumrall, "but attorneys in the Georgia case want to wait and see what happens."

Precedent Set in San Francisco Murder

As the result of a recent murder trial in San Francisco, killers who prey on gay men may face a rougher day in court. Such crimes have frequently gone lightly punished because of claims by the killer that he acted in self-defense after being sexually molested by his victim.

That is what defense attorneys claimed happened to Dana Holley. In July 1981, Holley, then 19, murdered 51-year-old banker William Sink in Sink's posh San Francisco apartment where the two had gone after meeting in a bar. The former boxer contended that the older man was attempting to force him into having sex. According to public defender attorney Peter Keane, Holley behaved as though he were being raped which drove him into a rage. Keane also demonstrated some sexual confusion

in Holley that, he claimed, set off a panic in the young man. The result was the beating and stabbing to death of William Sink. Holley also admitted to previous attacks on gay men.

The jury, however, didn't buy Keane's arguments which were dubbed the "homosexual panic" defense. Holley was convicted of first degree murder with special circumstances — due to the brutality of the killing. On July 29th, he was sentenced to life imprisonment without chance of parole.

Though it is expected that Holley's sentence will be appealed, Ron Huberman, investigator for prosecuting attorney Paul Cummins, stated that the case sets a precedent nonetheless that could alter the legal profession's handling of such cases. "They tried the 'homosexual panic' defense and it didn't work. Once a defense like that begins to fall apart, it simply becomes less

effective and all defending attorneys take notice."

The case had from the start pitted San Francisco's gay community against the public defender's office over the issue of homophobia being exploited in the case. At first, the defense claimed a \$15,000 survey showed that a fair trial was not possible in San Francisco with its large gay population. After change of venue was denied, the defense then attempted to dismiss gay men from the jury. Defense attorney Keane denied that it was a move against gays as a group, but did admit that "gays were excluded from the jury because of the publicity this case had received." After seven gay men were dismissed by the defense — not because they were gay but because they said they had read accounts of the killing in the local gay papers — prosecutor Cum-

GAY MAN ON DEATH ROW

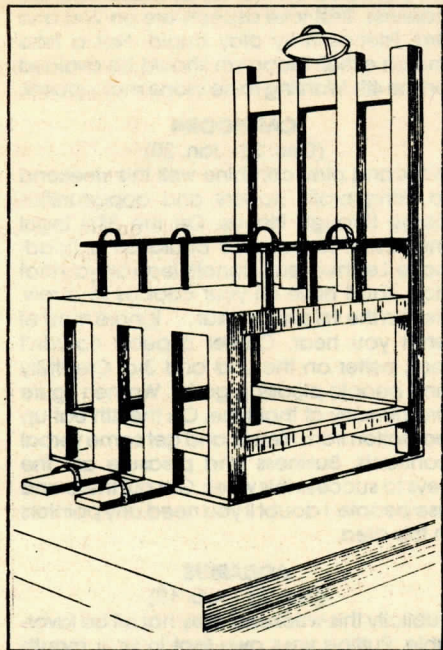

Robert Austin Sullivan is used to waiting. For a decade — longer than any other prisoner in the United States — he has been waiting on death row at Florida State Prison, and fighting for his life. He stands convicted of a 1973 murder, a murder he says he didn't commit.

His wait almost ended in 1979. He came within two days of the electric chair. He probably would be dead today were it not for the energetic support of a volunteer attorney and a few hundred people who have contributed to a defense fund.

It all began on Sunday night, April 8, 1973 when Donald Schmidt, the night manager of Howard Johnson's Restaurant in Homestead, Fla., disappeared with \$2,700 of the restaurant's money after locking up for the evening. His body was found two days later at a target range 19 miles away. Two shotgun blasts to the head, said the coroner. His wrist watch was missing, and so was his wallet and MasterCard. The card was used in the next few days, and police soon tracked down the user: Robert Sullivan, a former manager of the restaurant who resigned the previous year after an embezzlement investigation.

Sullivan contends he was set up for the murder rap and that he blundered into it.



He had just arrived back in Miami after a trip to New England and was staying in a motel with a traveling companion named Reid McLaughlin, whom he had met at a gay bar in Boston.

Relations between the two deteriorated, however, when a messy triangle developed with John Luchek, a former employee at Howard Johnson's. Things got even worse when Gilbert Jackson, whom both Sullivan and McLaughlin knew in Boston, flew in to spend the Easter vacation.

One day, McLaughlin showed Sullivan a MasterCard issued to a Donald Schmidt and said that Sullivan could use the card to repay expenses. McLaughlin said he had been going out with Schmidt, and had borrowed the card.

So Sullivan took the card and bought clothing. He also took a watch that McLaughlin, lent him because his own watch was in for repair. Those were the worst mistakes he ever made.

The following day Sullivan saw an account of the robbery-abduction-murder in the Miami News. Angrily he confronted McLaughlin, who finally confessed. Among his versions, McLaughlin claimed that he had committed the crime with Luchek. They had borrowed the shotgun and shot Schmidt twice. He was later to tell various cellmates that Jackson was the actual murderer.

Sullivan and McLaughlin were arrested on April 16 while driving home from a bar in Broward county. The car was searched even before they were read their rights, revealing a shotgun in the trunk and a pistol in the glove compartment. Police also found the MasterCard and what they claimed was the victim's watch on Sullivan. His protests of innocence and repeated requests to call an attorney, whom he had left only moments before at the bar, were ignored.

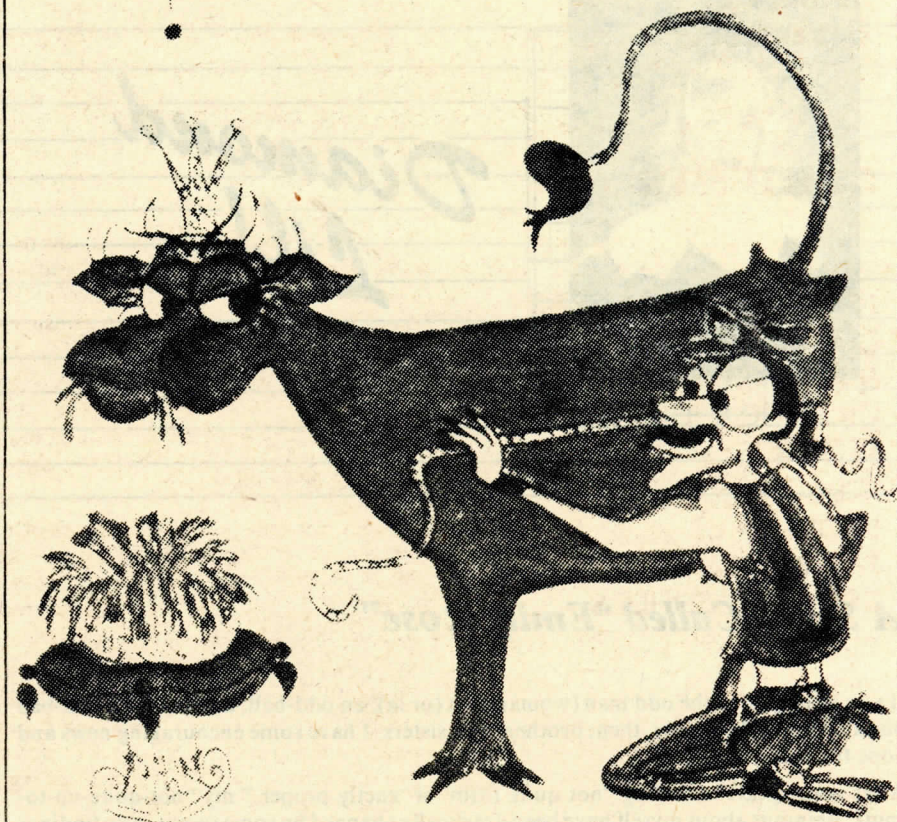
Police grilled Sullivan for more than eight hours before booking him, and he confessed.

Meanwhile, McLaughlin signed a statement that named Sullivan as the killer. Gilbert Jackson was released at the arrest scene after a brief questioning, and never brought to the police station or called as a witness.

Sullivan was pitifully naive, believing that his confession would be thrown out in court and that he would get a fair trial. But his father, a surgeon, refused to hire a lawyer. Instead Sullivan ended up with a public defender, Denis Dean who never contacted five people who Sullivan said could testify that he was forty miles away, at the Broward County bar at the time of the crime.

After his arrest, Sullivan had deliberately stated that he had beat Schmidt in the head with a tire iron and shot him four times, knowing that these statements would be contradicted by the autopsy report. Sullivan says Dean neither contacted any of the alibi witnesses nor exposed contradictions in the confession and in police testimony. He failed to note that the defendant's feet were larger than the footprints found at the scene. Dean says he tried to contact witnesses, but admitted to a Rolling Stone reporter that his enthusiasm was dampened by the belief that he was defending a guilty man who had failed a lie detector test. In court papers, Dean has been accused of providing an inadequate defense.

In his trial, Sullivan was portrayed as a cold-blooded killer wanting to commit the perfect crime. Then why, one wonders, would he have used the credit card of someone he had just murdered? He was quoted as saying during the interrogation, "I always wanted to commit a murder," a remark he denies he ever made.

One of those testifying against him was McLaughlin, who slipped during cross-examination and admitted, "My sentence depends on my testimony." (He received life with the possibility of early parole and was released in March, 1981.) McLaughlin did not pursue the slip, asking few questions of the state witnesses. He also refused to reveal that McLaughlin had lied four out of seven lie detector tests.

The police, prosecutor, judge and jury all agreed on Sullivan's homosexuality; and the prosecutor made repeated comparisons to John and Loeb. But there was no Clarence Darrow to get him off. He was found guilty and sentenced to die.

Robert Sullivan was the seventh person executed under Florida's new law. He has been on death row since November 14, 1974. His first appeal, automatically rejected by the statute, was to the state supreme court, where his death sentence was the first one to be upheld, by a 4 to 2 vote. In 1975, during the week of the Bicentennial, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled death penalty laws in Florida, Texas and Georgia unconstitutional; and shortly thereafter decided to hear Sullivan's direct appeal. Theoretically he still has one more chance

There are eight tunes on the album. None of the others are quite as spellbinding as "All Night," but all are equal in quality. "Can't Slow Down" is a nondescript tune which is heavily produced and doesn't hold up as a title cut. There's an odd song on side one called "Stuck On You" that sounds like it should be on a release named "Lionel Goes Country." Strangely enough it's a rather good country tune. All the other tunes are typically sweet love songs that have been produced to the point that makes one think that Barry Manilow must have helped out.

at the USSC before exhausting all appeals, provided he is not executed first.)

State legal aid is provided to capital cases only through the first appeal, and Denis Dean officially withdrew from the case in October 1976, leaving Sullivan without representation. Friends, shocked by the realization that Sullivan was being left to face a severe predicament alone, formed a defense fund. Through the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, an organization that represents indigent death row clients regardless of race, he met Roy Black of Miami, the first attorney to take an active interest in his case. He is volunteering as lead counsel, assisted by Anthony Amsterdam of New York University Law School, the nation's foremost authority on capital punishment. Black wants to get a new trial for Sullivan, but his most urgent task has been to keep him alive. Sullivan's case was presented to a clemency board in 1977. The ruling was negative, and Gov. Robert Graham signed the death warrant on June 19, 1979. Execution was set for 7 a.m. on June 27.

Sullivan was taken to the Superintendent's office to be informed of his new status, then taken to a cell behind the execution chamber. He began to plan his own funeral and burial arrangements.

Roy Black left his sickbed to argue for a stay of execution before the Florida Supreme Court, on Friday the 22nd. A stay was refused, by a four-to-three vote. In a bitter blow, Justice Boyd, who had voted for Sullivan in his 1974 appeal, had switched his vote. Yet Chief Justice Arthur England's vigorous dissent was adopted by U.S. District Judge Jose Gonzalez three

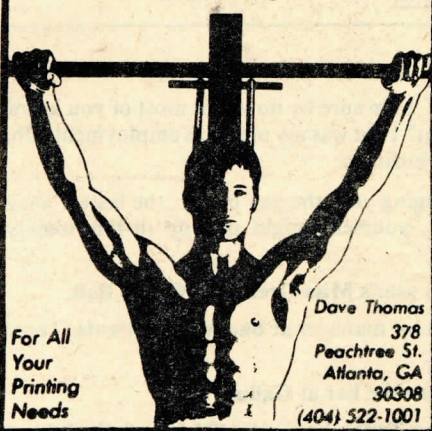

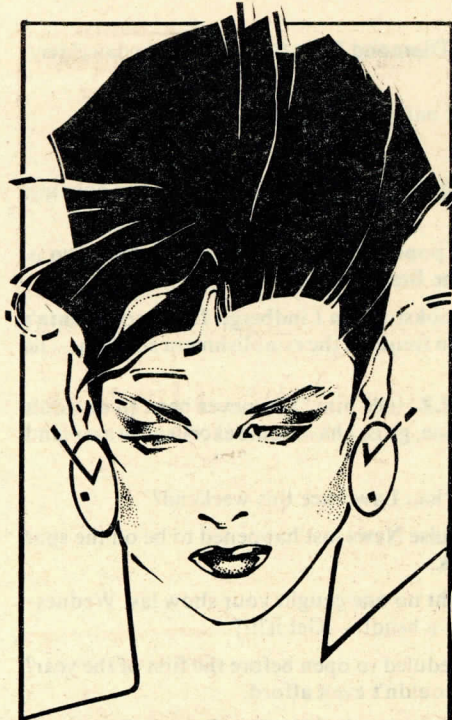

JUDGE RULES AGAINST GAY STUDENT RIGHTS

Washington, D.C. Superior Court Judge Sylvia Bacon ruled that Georgetown University can discriminate against its gay student groups, the Gay Community News reported. Judge Bacon acknowledged that the university's actions violate the D.C. Human Rights Act, but agreed with the assertion that, in this case, Georgetown's status as a religious institution makes it exempt from the law's provisions. Georgetown University claims affiliation with the Catholic Church, but also receives federal funding. 'That decision will be overturned,' predicted Atlanta activist Frank Scheuren, past president of the gay Catholic group Dignity. "It will be similar to the court's decision regarding Bob Jones University." Bob Jones University's tax exempt status as a religious institution was removed because of its enforcement of a ban on interracial dating and marriage.

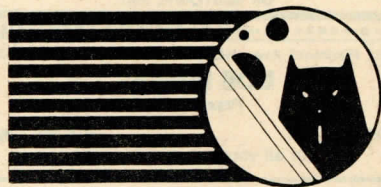

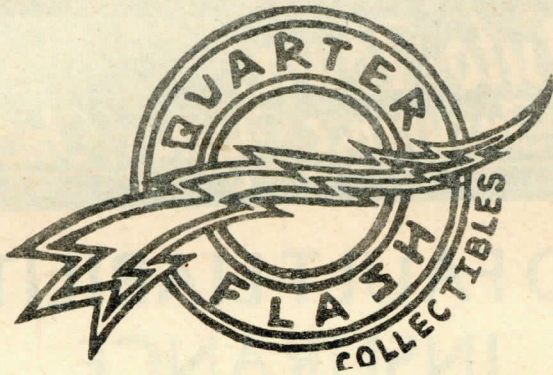

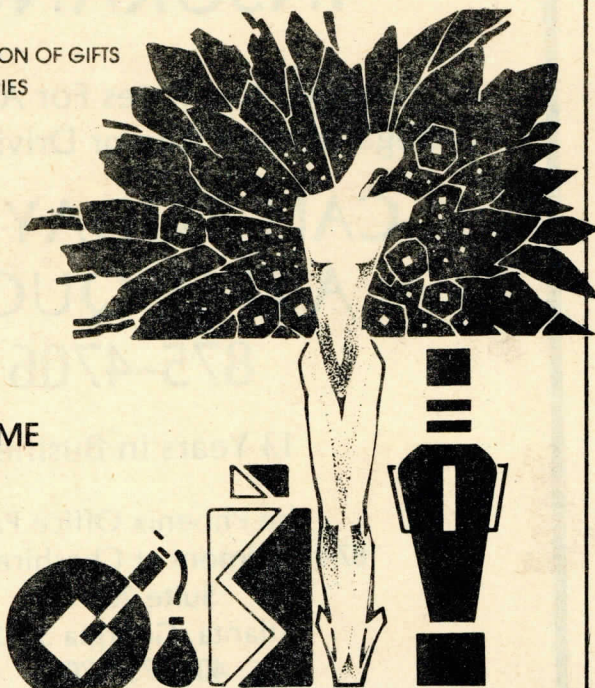

days later, when he granted an indefinite stay, 38 hours before Sullivan was to die.

Sullivan had survived the week with the support of many friends who wrote him, and a few who visited him every day. "It was not easy to preserve the balance between having hope, and yet also preparing for the worst," he wrote just after his stay had been granted. Cardinal Humberto Medeiros of Boston and a number of other bishops sent telegrams on his behalf to the Governor.

In a way, the signing of the death warrant proved beneficial for Sullivan: As a result, of the nationwide publicity brought by his plight, two new witnesses, William Harlow and Peter Trioighe, came forward to sign sworn statements that Sullivan had indeed been at the Broward County bar at the time of the murder. They were among the names he had given his public defenders to contact. Harlow had good reason to remember that night: It was his eighteenth birthday, the first time that he could legally drink in Florida.

And there have been new developments concerning evidence in the case. The adhesive tape that had bound the victim's wrists had two fingerprints that did not belong to either Schmidt, Sullivan or McLaughlin. When examining police evidence in 1978, Roy Black discovered that a clerk had destroyed the tape. And recently, Black's private investigator, Virginia Snyder, has ascertained from the victim's family that the Waltham watch found on Sullivan at his arrest was not Schmidt's, as has been alleged by both McLaughlin and

the police. His watch, they informed her "was very definitely a Timex."

Snyder also has succeeded in locating several more alibi witnesses. But one — the man at the Broward County bar who claimed to be an attorney — has refused to talk.

Other obstacles have arisen: Five days after being contacted by Black in August 1978, Gilbert Jackson was found murdered in his Winthrop, MA, home. The late David Brill, reporter for Boston's weekly Gay Community News, was also investigating the Sullivan case and believed in his innocence. Not long before his mysterious death in November, 1979, Brill's car was broken into and his briefcase taken. When the briefcase was recovered, the only film missing was Sullivan's.

In the four years since the death watch attempts to obtain a new trial have met with a series of legal setbacks in the federal court system. At the beginning of 1983, a three-judge panel of the Eleventh U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta unanimously rejected his appeal. In May the full Court refused to reconsider the rejection.

The next step is to appeal to the Supreme Court. If he loses there, the Governor of Florida could sign another death warrant. With all appeals exhausted, Sullivan's execution would be virtually certain, possibly before the end of the year — unless his lawyer could produce new points of appeal to persuade a judge to issue a stay.
