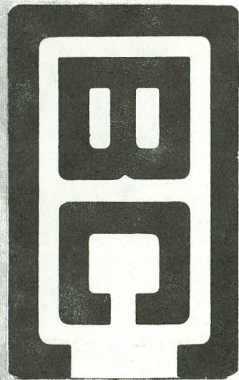

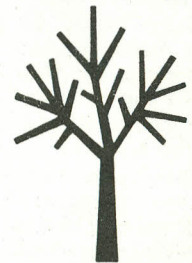

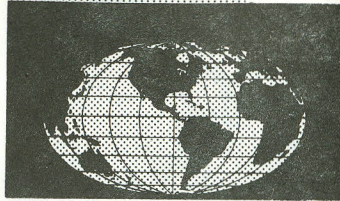

July 14th, The Parade Houston has brought to you from Los Angeles, California, The Rubber City Rebels. (New Wave)

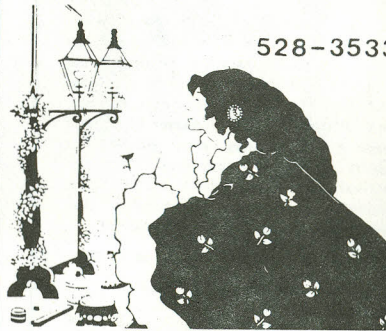
Mustangs leave on tour July 18 for Dallas, Phoenix, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Reno, Nevada and points in between.

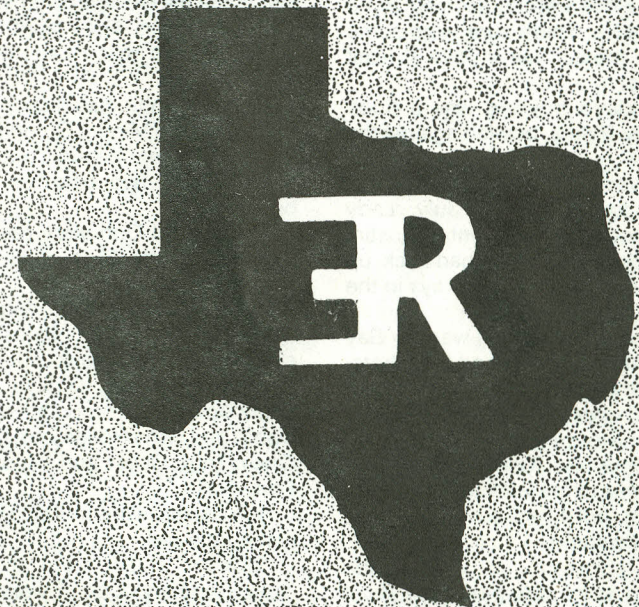

THE PAEZ PROBLEM

Gays who are still languishing under the impression that faith and good works will bring justice home to us should consider the Fred Paez case.

As Ballistics Expert Arthur Alphin pointed out at a press conference last week at the MCC, there's no way in hell Paez could have been shot under the circumstances outlined by HPD officer K.M. McCoy.

The official story, as reported by the *Post* and *Chronicle*, is that Paez, stretched out for "patting down" against a police car (for arrest under some yet unnamed offense), reached a hand behind him to push away McCoy's .45 pistol when it "went off".

Coroner's reports show that the bullet lodged in Paez's skull. Had Fred been shot at the close range HPD records state, his head would have suffered more damage than the coroner's report shows. Apparently, he was at some 15-20 feet, walking or running away from the officers, when one of them shot him.

Paez was unarmed, not drunk, and not under arrest. The reports filed by officials are in extreme variance in the facts offered. But Paez was probably *not* shot under conditions outlined in the first police report.

What happened to Fred Paez? Probably no one will know unless the GPC Investigatory Panel (Debra Danburg, Ray Hill, Sue Cummings, Lee Harrington, and James Kuhn) continues to press the issue.

To Americans, who've seen 20-50 years of lynchings of blacks, burning of Mexican-Americans, harassment of Jews, rape, and violation of American women's rights in the workplace, the death of a gay person at the hands of police is not unusual.

But the fact this kind of brutality has happened repeatedly before, especially by police, can no longer justify its continuing to happen now. It's 1980. We've just celebrated the July Fourth remembrance of our liberation from an oppressive government. We must stand for Fred Paez and all other Americans who are dying to win the rights promised by the U.S. Constitution NOW.

White Christian straight males can no longer demonstrate their "superiority" in running this country. Under 200 years of their leadership, a vast array of crimes against individuals have been permitted to evade full justice under our courts system. Until ALL Americans are as free as this one minority, justice under the law is a matter of whim, prejudice, under-the-table deals, and promises of favors bargained for personal advancement.

Houston's gay community must take action NOW to tell HPD no more shootings of non-violent gay people will be tolerated. The HPD has long had the attitude that "preventive law enforcement" is the way to handle the minorities in the city. To them, this means intimidation—fear of police—can ensure the mass of oppressed people won't react against them.

This "preventive" idea resulted in the death of Joe Torres, Reggie Lee Jackson, Bobby Joe Conner—and Fred Paez. Police commonly, if we are to believe our newspapers (which is arguable), plant guns, dope, and other illegal goods on innocent people.

They shoot folks who are unarmed (remember the guy who was pulling out his Bible?) and non-violent. They are quick on the trigger to an outrageous degree. They run across lawns in the Fourth Ward, Montrose, or Washington's Chicano community, "chasing criminals." Sometimes they stumble and fall down and shoot bystanders in the process. (They don't behave this way in River Oaks or Memorial, you notice.)

The entire matter would be funny, like a Keystone Kops movie, if so many good gays, blacks, Chicanos weren't dying, and if so many women weren't being harassed on the street by police who wish to intimidate them into sex. And don't tell me THAT doesn't happen because I've been an eye-witness to that on several occasions. (The women in question were straight, and waiting on a bus or undertaking some other such "illegal" activity.)

When Hitler's socialists moved into Denmark and required all Jews to wear armbands with the yellow Star of David, the next morning after the decree went out the King of Denmark took his morning ride wearing just such an armband. Soon, all citizens wore them, and the socialist oppressors couldn't tell the Jews from the gentiles.

It's time for us to have a Fred Paez armband, complete with the pink triangle and the words "Never Again" underneath. We should wear them all the time. We should get Lalor and Tinsley to wear them—and Danburg, and everyone else we've elected to office. We demand they protect us from violence at the hands of the police.

We must also organize LARGE and well-informed pressure groups to tell HPD that no more gay people are going to be arrested for nothing, or die because they feel like emptying their guns into some gay man or woman and KNOW they won't have to be called for account about it.

Everyone in the gay community knows one person (probably, unfortunately, more) who has been beaten by either fagbashers or police. If we don't move NOW to stop violence against our people, these pathological oppressors will continue to try to keep our folks down by intimidation and stron-arm tactics. And if you think this is paranoid, try asking anybody over 40 from Germany just how the Brownshirts there began with the minorities, beating them up, killing some from time to time, to send the message of "law and order" to those weaker than themselves.

The record is clear: when homophobes gain the upper hand in one area, they aren't satisfied until they gain more power and more turf. But they are dangerous, amoral people and must be stopped NOW before more gay people die. Get involved—join Montrose Patrol, GPC, form non-violent HPD resistance groups. Keeping the community cool during the Gay Pride parade is one thing. Making sure Paez is remembered—and died for SOMETHING, SOME CHANGE—is another.

'Sleazy' David

I really don't understand disco because Barney demolished an ankle while jogging just as the transition from rock to disco began. So he has sat out the disco era. Where else do you hear the beat?

A gay magazine Barney writes for gave him an assignment to compile a list of all the discos in Houston and tell their readers something about each. So I had no choice but to learn.

"YMCA! YMCA!...Young man——" boomed out everywhere he went. So that's disco. "YMCA!" That must be gay disco.

Before Barney finished the disco guide "Macho Macho Man" had taken over and rang in his ears for weeks. This was a distinct sound. And this group stood out from all the rest. No question of where they were coming from "In the Navy! In the Navy!" Images say more than words.

One night at his Mom's, Barney saw the group on a Bob Hope Special. He really didn't get much out of the lyric "Go West! Go West!" or whatever, for he was in a mild state of shock at his first sight of the singers. Barney's mother watched silently. Barney decided that it was the group's idea of a drag show for TV—men in men's clothing. . .and war paint and feathers and chains and chaps and uniforms and a hardhat. (Barney's queer for hard hats!) The performance was innocuous enough.

Barney's Mom has never been exposed to anything but negative images of gays. She doesn't know any "bad" people, so she doesn't "know any gays." She has two gay sons, but we are good boys. She loves us. Gays are somebody else's children. Realistically, she cannot be humanized at this point and for medical and humanitarian reasons no attempt should be made. To use one of her favorite expressions, she "came by it (her fear of gays) honest." She does not hate us, but fear is a corollary of hate and the two feed on one another and cannot really be separated.

Barney chanced on the group's new

album "Live and Sleazy" and bought it: "Sleazy! Sleazy!" it goes to a tune by Johnny one-note. That cover! "Sleazy" is hardhat David's song, and the wardrobe department has left nothing to the imagination. David's undershirt is ripped off except for the shoulder straps and here and there filthy fragments of the original. Nothing's in the way of David's anatomy from his belly button to his hairline. And he has a life-sized handprint in grease across his chest—would it were my handprint. Of course I'm turned on, but the very next week I was at Mom's for dinner and no sooner were we done than it was announced: "what was first called a musical joke, but is now the second most popular singing group in America" would be on the following program. We watched. The announcer chatted away about "their overt sexuality" . . . "their homosexuality" . . .

All right. Nothing wrong with that, but enter David in his album-cover costume: "Sleazy! Sleazy!" the group sang. And they were. I love the originality of the group — and David's a real hunk all sleazed up, but is record promotion so important that they should create an image in prime time that shocks and evokes disgust in persons with little or no experience with gays? That episode confirmed all the fear in folks like my Mom.

Sleazy, David. Sleazy, indeed.

My Mom's only words in my presence about Anita Bryant was a comment before switching channels on Anita: "That woman should have stayed home." We can trust some people to be at least neutral unless we give them something that scares them. Images are important. We will eventually overcome our present vulnerability to them, but the classic reaction to a stereotyped group is that we are all the same. We've got a long way to go, baby, before we put sleaze in the living room, a long way.

But, David, you can be sleazy at my house anytime.

YOU and YOUR BODY

Avoid Too Much Fat, Saturated Fat, and Cholesterol

If you have a high blood cholesterol level, you have a greater chance of having a heart attack. Other factors can also increase your risk of heart attack—high blood pressure and cigarette smoking, for example—but high blood cholesterol is clearly a major dietary risk indicator.

Populations like ours with diets high in saturated fats and cholesterol tend to have high blood cholesterol levels. Individuals within these populations usually have greater risks of having heart attacks than people eating low-fat, low-cholesterol diets.

Eating extra saturated fat and cholesterol will increase blood cholesterol and still keep normal blood cholesterol levels. Other people, unfortunately, have high blood cholesterol levels even if they eat low-fat, low-cholesterol diets.

There is controversy about what recommendations are appropriate for healthy Americans. But for the U.S. population as a whole, reduction in our current intake of total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol is sensible. This suggestion is especially appropriate for people who have high blood pressure or who smoke.

The recommendations are not meant to prohibit the use of any specific food item or to prevent you from eating a variety of foods. For example, eggs and organ meats (such as liver) contain cholesterol, but they also contain many essential vitamins and minerals, as well as protein. Such items can be eaten in moderation, as long as your overall cholesterol intake is not excessive. If you prefer whole milk to skim milk, you can reduce your intake of fats from foods other than milk.

TO AVOID TOO MUCH FAT, SATURATED FAT, AND CHOLESTEROL

- Choose lean meat, fish, poultry, dry beans and peas as your protein sources
- Moderate your use of eggs and organ meats (such as liver)
- Limit your intake of butter, cream, hydrogenated margarines, shortenings and coconut oil, and foods made from such products
- Trim excess fat off meats
- Broil, bake, or boil rather than fry
- Read labels carefully to determine both amount and types of fat contained in foods

SPORTS AWARENESS WEEKEND

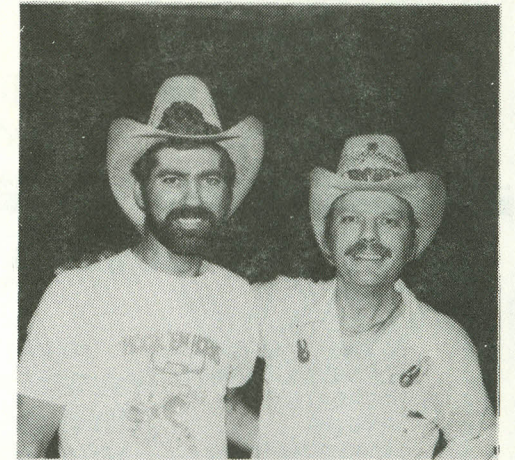
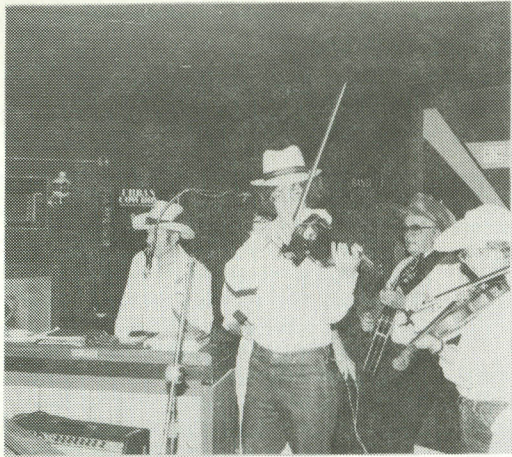
The weekends of July 19 & 20 and July 26 & 27 has been claimed as Sports Awareness Weekend.

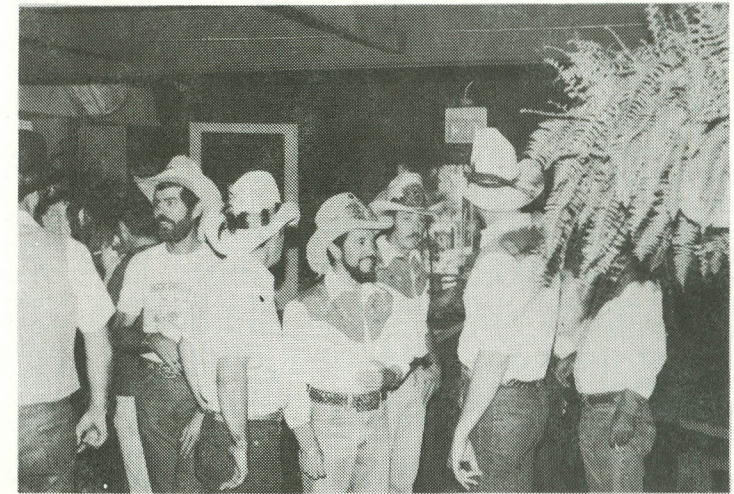

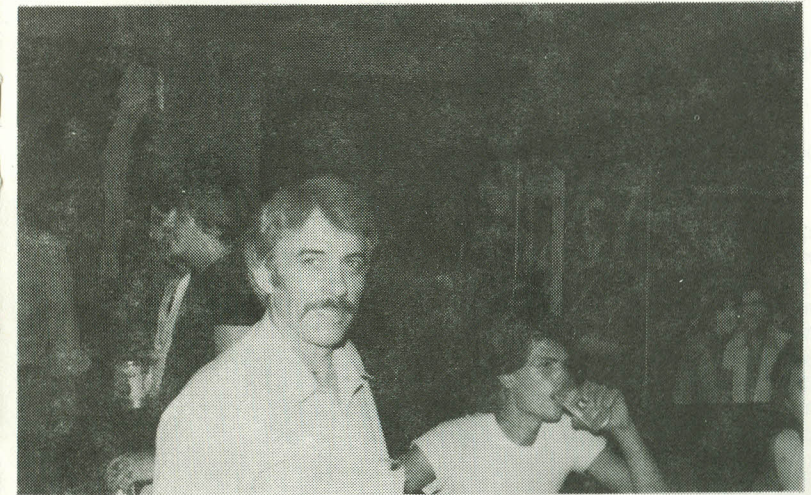
