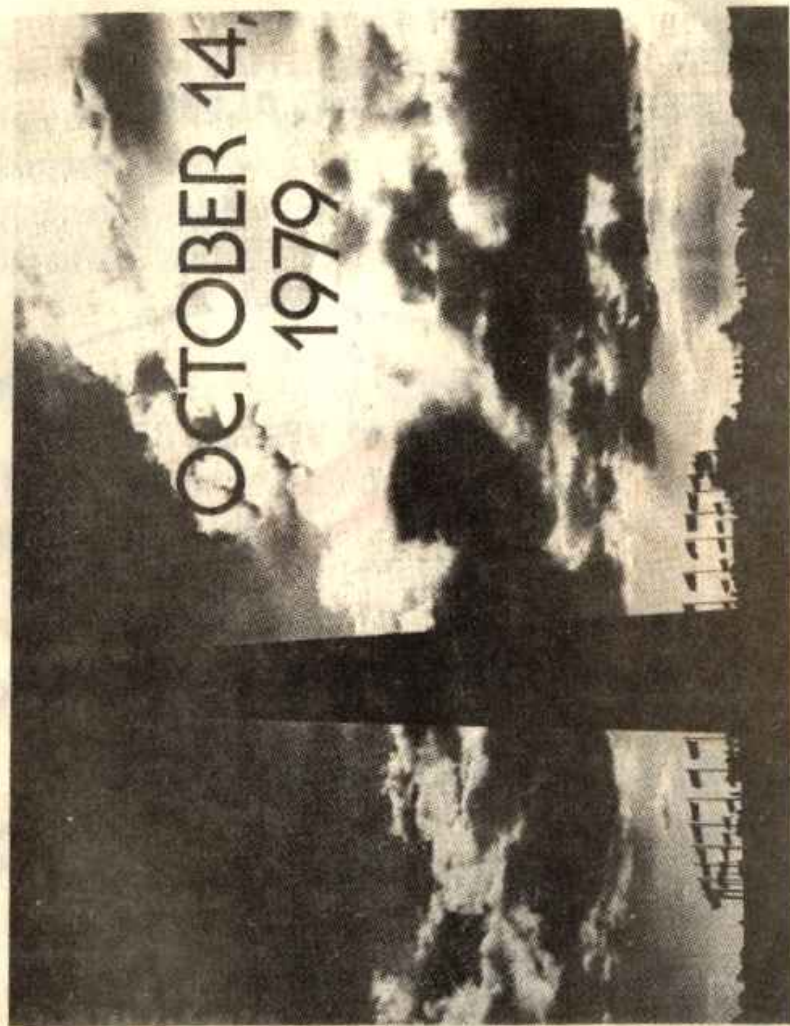

## Clap, Clap, Clap, Clap, Clap — But Mother's Not Applauding!

**This is not an article on applause...**It is about a dreaded disease called Gonorrhrea.

### ONE MO' TIME

There are 9 major ("biggie") Broadway shows touring the U.S. at this time. Two of the biggest are the reworked "Fiddler on the Roof", and "Annie". Another one of note, (in particular to our community) is "One Mo' Time" playing currently at the Tower Theatre. "A special Montrose Day at the Tower" matinee (with profits from tickets sales going to support of the community) will be held Sunday afternoon, the 12th of October.

"One Mo' Time" is the artistic expression of writer, director, and stage star, Varnell Bagnaris, 31. "One Mo' Time" has been billed as a "Family Show", and it is. There is no explicit language or the like. But in the words of Neil Simon "it is pure sex". "One Mo' Time" achieves that duality of personality from its double-entendre — masterful mix of state-

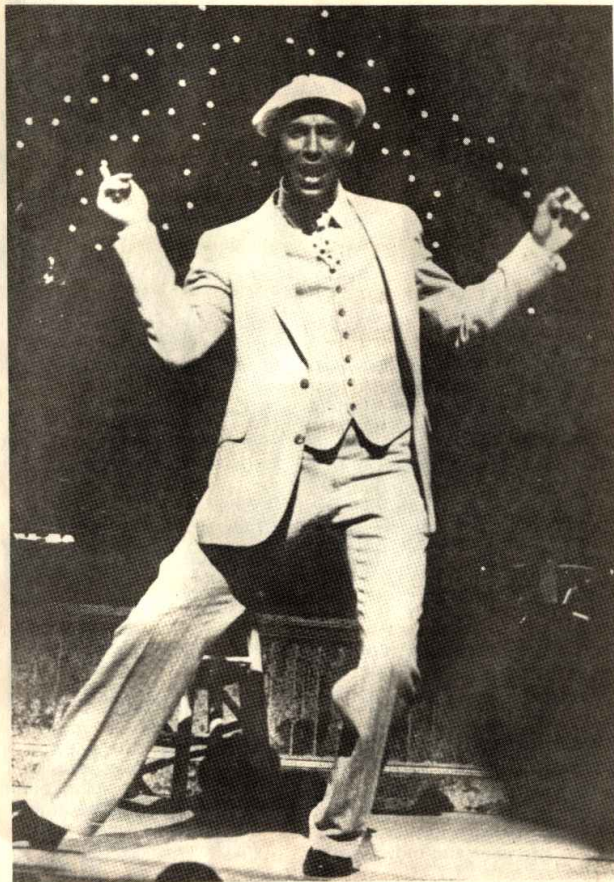
ment and entertainment. A Junior High 9th grade Poetry class would see it as excellence in verse and rhyme, meter and song. A sophisticated adult with his ears open would pick up on a rich white woman's lament about the leaving of her black "kitchen man" about the prospects of missing "the way he warms up my chops" and the "long lovely hot sausages of his".

Political statement is there too - the vaudeville black farce bit conveys the stereo-type only in appearance. The message that is put forth is hands-on-the-hip sass back, bold and daring commentary. It leaves you laughing and thinking all at the same time.

It's the effect "One Mo' Time" extracts from the audience that conveys the most about the show. A little black lady in her eighties gets carried away and does a dance in the aisle. A business-man in his Brooks Brothers and his fashion-plate dressed wife, can't sit down and finally break out in a 50's Lindy. Teenagers act like they're at a rock concert. Gay's applaud the camp lines of "The wrong key in the wrong key-hole". they know all about that.

Varnell, the brother of Houston's own activist/politician Larry Bagnaris is proud of his brother and he's proud of his show. Montrose Day at the Tower should be an event not to be missed.

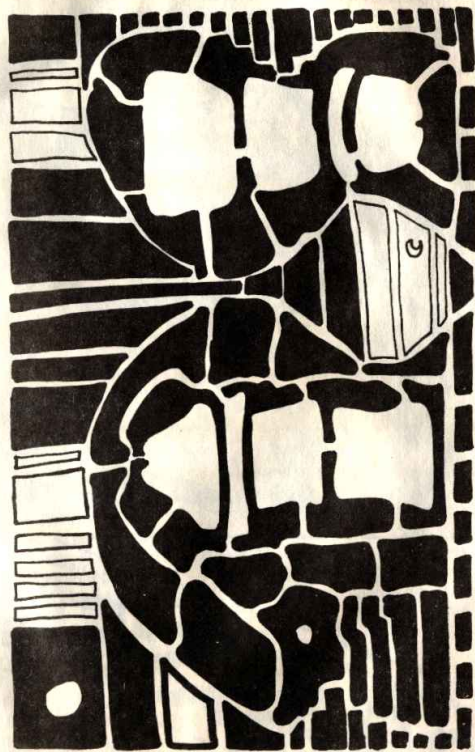

barbwire barricades. It was, to say the least, a very moving experience. I heard some of the horror stories about life in Cuba, and their life thus far in America. I saw the scars — the physical ones — and the emotional.

I also saw something else. Hope — bright, laughing, loving faces — that for the first time saw life as something more than a beating from the blunt end of a rifle. I saw human compassion and purposeful directing of living into constructive channels. Education, jobs, counseling — elements of living that make us all tick.

Houston should be proud of the effort. What's more we should be supportive — a lot more supportive than we have been up to now. Not only seemly for the sake of our brothers and sisters, these Cubans, but reciprocally for ourselves. This strenuous exercise in working with and through governmental channels have taught us a great deal and achieved a breakthrough in dealing with the system. That knowledge could eventually help us all.

The Cuban Refugee effort needs help. Your response is urgently requested.

There will be a welcoming party for our new community neighbors and their sponsors in Mary's Patio, Sunday, the 12th. Don't take my word for the opinion that this is a necessary and very worthwhile project — come and see for yourself. If the life and livelihood of any of our brothers and sisters means anything to you, you'll be there.

A steady stream of Cuban refugees are trickling into the Houston area. These are real flesh and blood humanity individuals, the "flotsam of Castros' Cuba" discarded on America's shores, battered, beaten and deprived because they did not fit into Fidel's communistic fantasy trip. Heard into compounds, deprived of privacy, sneered at, shot at, and pushed around like so much cattle, how they have managed to hang on to what little self-pride and identity they had left is a story in itself.

Through the combined talents of community leaders such as Rev. Dee Lamb, MCCR Fellowship, Phil Slusser, Chair of Houston's Family, and Services Coordinator for the refugee effort, and a (all-too-small) giving, caring and sharing group of sponsors from the community, these refugees are being helped through the trauma of their past experiences and present culture-shock into meaningful and productive roles in our society.

Fighting through bureaucratic entanglements, prejudices, official indifference, and a virtual mountain of red-tape and paperwork, Rev. Lamb and Slusser and the rest are performing the impossible.

I met some of the refugees at a gathering at MCCR Church this week. A small representative number of the large number of Gay Cubans still locked behind

...BESIDES AN UNKNOWN NUMBER IN THE CLOSET, Ft. Chaffee has 150 known gays and lesbians in need of sponsors. In addition, some non-gay sponsors have kicked their refugees out into the street upon finding out that these people were gay.

The Rev. Dee Lamb, Facilitator for the Houston Cuban Refugee Relief Program and student pastor at MCCR, says that we need more sponsors for gay/lesbian refugees. She adds that the Houston community has really supported the Relief Program: there is a community meeting every Monday night at MCCR with 30-50 people in attendance. (The meeting begins at 7:30. MCCR is located at 1919 Decatur.)

Besides sponsors, volunteers are needed to provide transportation, help with job placement, tutor, etc. You can donate clothing at three locations: MCCR, phone 861-9149, Wilde 'n' Stein Bookstore, 520 Westheimer, phone 529-7014, or Montrose Family, phone 522-5427.

OCTOBER 14, 1979 - 1980

### MARCHING ON.. BY KENT NAASZ

The day was like any other fall day. It had rained the night before leaving the ground wet like a sponge. The sky was clean and clear. The air was cool and brisk. The sun was bright and shining. The leaves were dressing in their fall colors. It was a beautiful day.

Yet the day was not an ordinary day. It was a day filled with joy, excitement, happiness and pride. For three days we came by the thousands pouring into the city. We arrived by any means available. Some of us came by car and van caravans, others on foot, hitch-hiking, and still others arrived by bus, train or plane.

We came and kept on coming! We were from every nationality, every race, every belief, every age, every gender and flavor. We came from the beaches of Hawaii, the cold artic of Alaska, the Great Plains of South Dakota, the fishing villages of Vermont and Maine, and the oil capitol of the world, "Houston, of course." We came from as far away as Puerto Rico and New Zealand.

We came and kept on coming! The gathering place-the Capitol end of the Mall, Washington D.C. The day - October 14th, 1979. The event - The National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights.

Oh what a day! We were 170,000 strong and we still kept on coming. We were here with our families and friends. We were high and not because of drugs. We were here in D.C. to celebrate our freedom. We came with the hope and belief that one day there would be "an end to all social, economic, judicial and legal oppression of Lesbian and Gay people."

We marched down Penn. Ave. a proud and beautiful people. Penn. Ave., the Capitol and the rest of the world would never be the same. People reached the monument 30 - 45 minutes before the last person left the gathering place. And we still kept on coming filled with pride, dignity, and freedom.

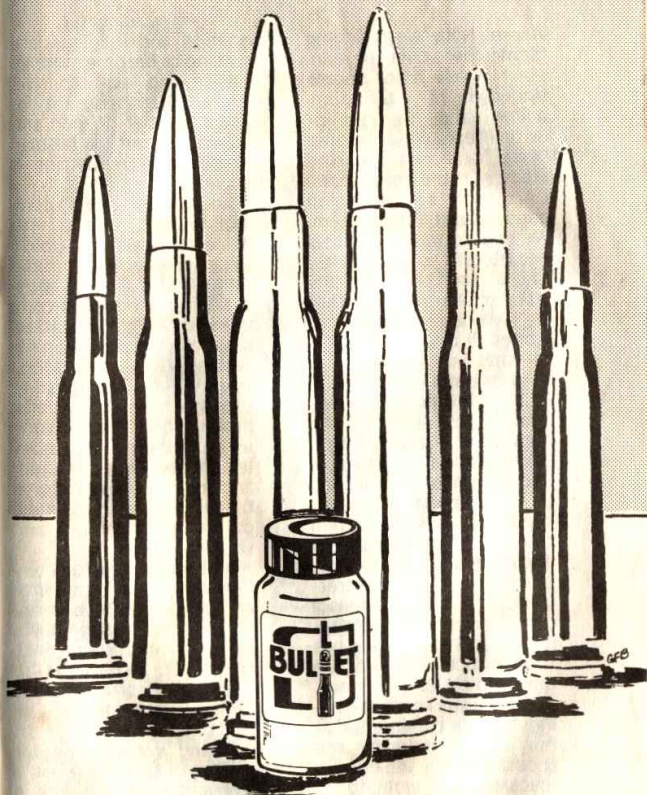
Yes, we marched making demands! We demanded that all anti-lesbian/gay laws be repealed. We demanded that Congress pass a comprehensive lesbian/gay rights bill. We demanded that a presidential executive order be issued banning discrimination based on sexual orientation in the Federal Government, the military and federally-contracted private employment. We demanded an end to discrimination in lesbian mother and gay father,

custody cases. And we still kept coming. We demanded that our lesbian and gay youth be protected from any laws which are used to discriminate against, oppress and/or harass them in their homes, schools, jobs and social environment.

We were realistic and knew that the demands would not be met over night. Yet we still kept on coming knowing that we were free and no one was going to oppress us. The March showed us our strength, our power, our love, care and concern which we had for ourselves and each other. We were free and gave ourselves permission "To Be!"

And today we still keep on coming. We look back and remember! The Lone Star flag waving proudly over our motel. The miracle-MCCR's bus breaking down a few hours outside D.C. with Phyllis still making it in time to lead Houston with a Bible in one hand and the national flag in the other. Ray Hill smartly dressed in Texas Ruby and then emceeing in his jail house trusty's uniform. Troy Perry being horse before the largest gay/lesbian assembly in his career. The speeches, the singing, the chants, and the beautiful men and women every-

where. Holly Near singing "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" while two people signed for the hearing impaired, and the rest of us in tears. The parties! Disco Grandma wearing Steve's rhinestone hats. L.A.'s choir and marching band - can't forget them. We met so many beautiful people, did so many crazy things, and had so many wonderful experiences that we will be able to tell stories til the end of time. Oh what a day!

And we still keep on coming! There is now a gay/lesbian rights plank in the Democratic Party platform. Jerry Falwell signed a declaration of war against us over National TV. The far right wing has joined him to form the moral majority and do us all in. They all saw our strength and our freedom; and they trembled! Our society, our government and our churches took notice that we are here and are here to stay.

And we still keep on coming! We are coming out of our closets now by the thousands. We are getting involved and working to unite and not divide ourselves. Yes we have more to do within our own community. However our organizations, both

political and religious, are striving to become more inclusive and less exclusive. There is becoming a more equal number of men and women on our gay/lesbian boards. We are getting it together.

And we still keep on coming! On Oct. 14th & 15th Wilde 'n' Stein will do 30 hours of lesbian/gay radio on KPFT 90.1 FM and sponsor an open house in commemoration of The National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. They will be broadcasting excerpts from the national broadcast of the rally, along with poetry, music, history lesson, political thought, and issues of religion. Come by for fellowship, sharing, coffee and donuts, and wine coolers.

And we still keep on coming! GPC, Disco Grandma, and other members of the community are going down to the evening session of City Council on Oct. 21 to speak on lesbian and gay rights. I encourage you all to come down. Those of you who wish to speak for one to three minutes on a gay/lesbian issue should call the city secretary, phone 222-3301 and ask for speaking time on Tuesday, October 21. It is our right to come before City Council

# REVIEW

## GAY PARENTHOOD— INSIGHTS

Good literature should do more than reflect contemporary problems — it should put them into perspective, perhaps even have an influence on the resolution of a problem, or on the way in which people view a certain type of situation.

**Natural Acts**, by James Fritzhand, is just such literature. It is a concise study of the workings in our society of homophobia written in a smooth, factual, moving way with the potential for a definite influence on people's prejudices. It would be a fine selection for high school literature courses, but I DOUBT THAT MANY SCHOOLS, EVEN THE MOST PROGRESSIVE, WOULD RISK ASSIGNING IT TO THEIR STUDENTS. Why? Because the book is about homosexuals, or homosexuality, and children — which is the tender spot in the civil-rights-for-Gays movement. Even "liberal" straights sometimes succumb to the irrational fear that their children or teenagers are going to be corrupted or converted by a homosexual influence (be it teacher or book).

Consider the plot of **Natural Acts**. A dying woman leaves guardianship of her 11-year old in the hands of her two best friends — a homosexual couple

Knowing she is dying, the woman plans to marry one of the men and then have him legally adopt the child. But her sudden death leaves only her will as evidence of her desire to have the two gay men raise her daughter. The child's aunt and uncle, two rather typically conservative do-gooders, contest the will on the grounds that the homosexuals are providing an immoral environment for the child's upbringing. Reading **Natural Acts** is an emotional experience. Not only are the descriptive scenes, both of the mother's death and of the court battles, painfully detailed and discomfiting, but the dialog is real enough to make you envision the characters as real people, as people you've known and loved (or hated). The author's remarkable ability to bring his characters to life is important, especially in the last chapter, as the book takes an unexpected turn. Only a very skilled writer could handle the last few pages of the book with such controlled pacing.

The book is a landmark for gays. Not only does it argue the case for gay parenthood exceptionally well, but it also creates sympathy for the two men not just by telling us that they're the good guys, but, primarily, by **showing** us their humanity, and their capability as parents.

While it would have been convenient and simplistic for Fritzhand to paint the aunt and uncle as the bad guys (black hats and all), he chooses, instead, to relegate them to the lesser position of the misinformed. They emerge as not altogether heartless villains; and although you may find yourself foaming with anger at their bigotry, the author eventually leads you to see their humanity 1/2.

After all, Fritzhand seems to be saying, what else do we all really have but our humanity...and it is this shared humanness which eventually decides the outcome of the book.

All in all, this is a highly recommended, readable and moving tale.

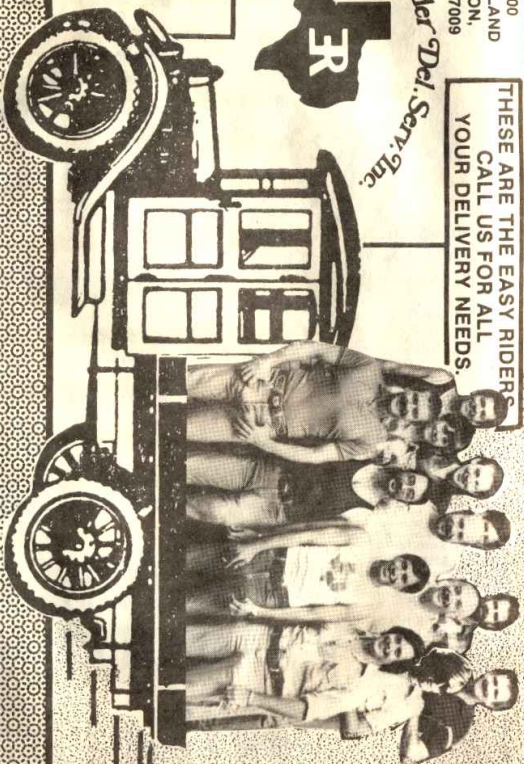
