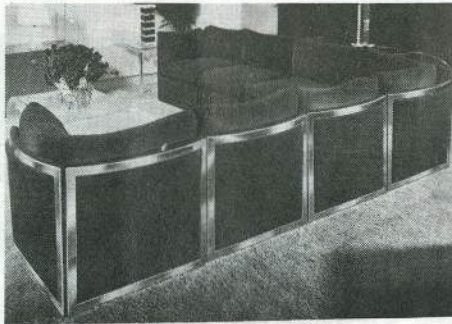

Who needs iron? We all do. Who needs extra iron in pills, nostrums or enriched foods? No adults, for the most part, unless they are losing blood. Such are the timely findings of Dr. William Crosby of California reporting on the physicians' P.R.N. daily radio network.

Blood loss is the single major cause of significant iron deficiency anemia in adults. The most common blood loss in females is in menstruation. In only 5% of menstruating women is there sufficient loss requiring extra iron supplementation, states Dr. Crosby. The daily adult iron requirements is only one mg.

The most common cause of iron deficiency anemia in adult males and post menopausal females is blood loss from disease, such as bleeding ulcers, or in particular, cancer of the colon. The cause must therefore be found early, rather than be treated with iron. It might be cancer and curable.

In ancient Greek mythology, health was gained by drinking wine sprinkled with rust. No one would buy that nostrum mix today, but contemporary advertising mythology has fostered another fable called "tired blood" and its relative "iron poor blood." Women are encouraged to take iron loaded medications indiscriminately—

WHAT'S IN A NAME? ...



PEGASUS: A Greek Cultural mythological symbol ("the Greek Culture" is used interchangeably many times with the term "Gay Lifestyle"). PEGASUS is depicted as a winged horse majestically thundering through the heavens, flashing sparks ... the winged champion of victory.

PEGASUS was born from Medusa's body at her death. Medusa was one of the THREE GORGONS depicted in Greek Literature as Three Sisters ("male, female, bi- counterparts of us all") with snakes for hair. The snake was an emblem for eternity of life (as snakes were supposed to live forever). Thus the disjointed snake used as the First American Flag of the original thirteen colonies ... "Don't tread on me."

PEGASUS is best known in the Greek tradition for stamping his hoof upon Mt. Helicon (the home of the muses ... the nine goddesses who presided over LITERATURE, WRITING, POETRY and the LIFE SCIENCES). This action was responsible for the creation of an eternal spring known as Hippocrene. Hippocrene is the fountain of INSPIRATION AND GENIUS that is supposed to inspire all great poets and writers (including Oscar Wilde and Gertrude Stein?).

PEGASUS or similar depiction of the winged horse has been used for centuries as symbols of VICTORY and GREATNESS. War memorials, monuments, victory arches and the like have borrowed the PEGASUS emblem frequently.

This enduring and inspiring symbol of culture and continuing greatness is certainly a benefiting symbol for our Gay Community's newest and best news, entertainment and service publication.

Many of us know Robin Tyler as one of the emcees for the March on Washington rally. Since her rise to popularity via college campuses, theatres, and gay bars, papers like the N.Y. Sunday Times, the San Francisco Chronicle and The Advocate have compared the lesbian-feminist comic to Lenny Bruce. Her style isn't like Bruce's but, as Tyler puts it, she goes "totally against the system." While tickling our funny bone she manages to raise our consciousness.

In "Mother Jones" Tyler entolled: "Humor has always been used to tell the truth. It goes back to the court jester.... People told him their problems because he was the only one who could tell the king without being beheaded."

Can Racism, sexism, organized right-wing fanaticism and homophobia be funny topics? When Robin Tyler takes a jab at them, they are.

A few of her observations on the current scene of the late 70's and emerging 80's:

"Anita Bryant is to Christianity what paint-by-numbers is to art."

On President Carter and his infamous brother:

"Billy only says what Jimmy thinks."

On Jerry Brown's support of gay rights:

Robin Tyler terms much of past "gay humor," particularly as done by many drag queens, as the product of homophobically induced self-loathing and being "Swishin' Fetchits."

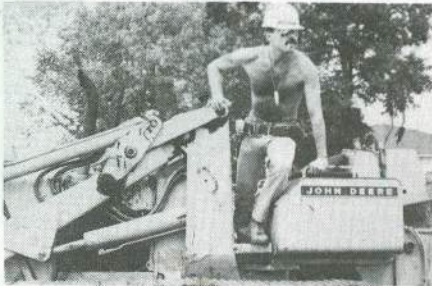
(8) To employ a style, a format, and quality of craftsmanship in all aspects of this publication that will inform, educate and entertain to the highest degree of perfection obtainable.

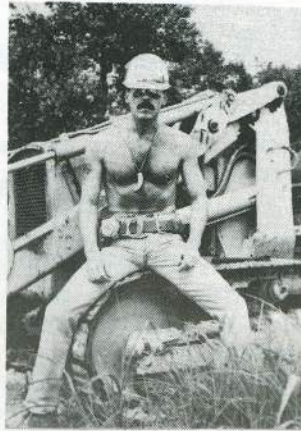
went on a short sojourn with his family to the land of nod ... another Gateway city ... the city by the bay. There he found the city of dreams, a city he was to return to some ten years

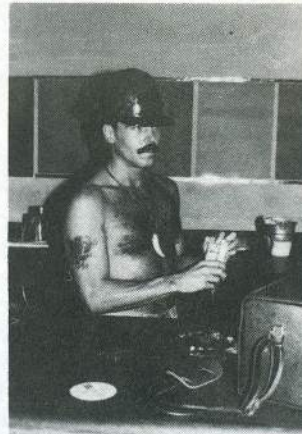
Where though would you find that same man that left his harbor paradise some five years later to seek, as he puts it,



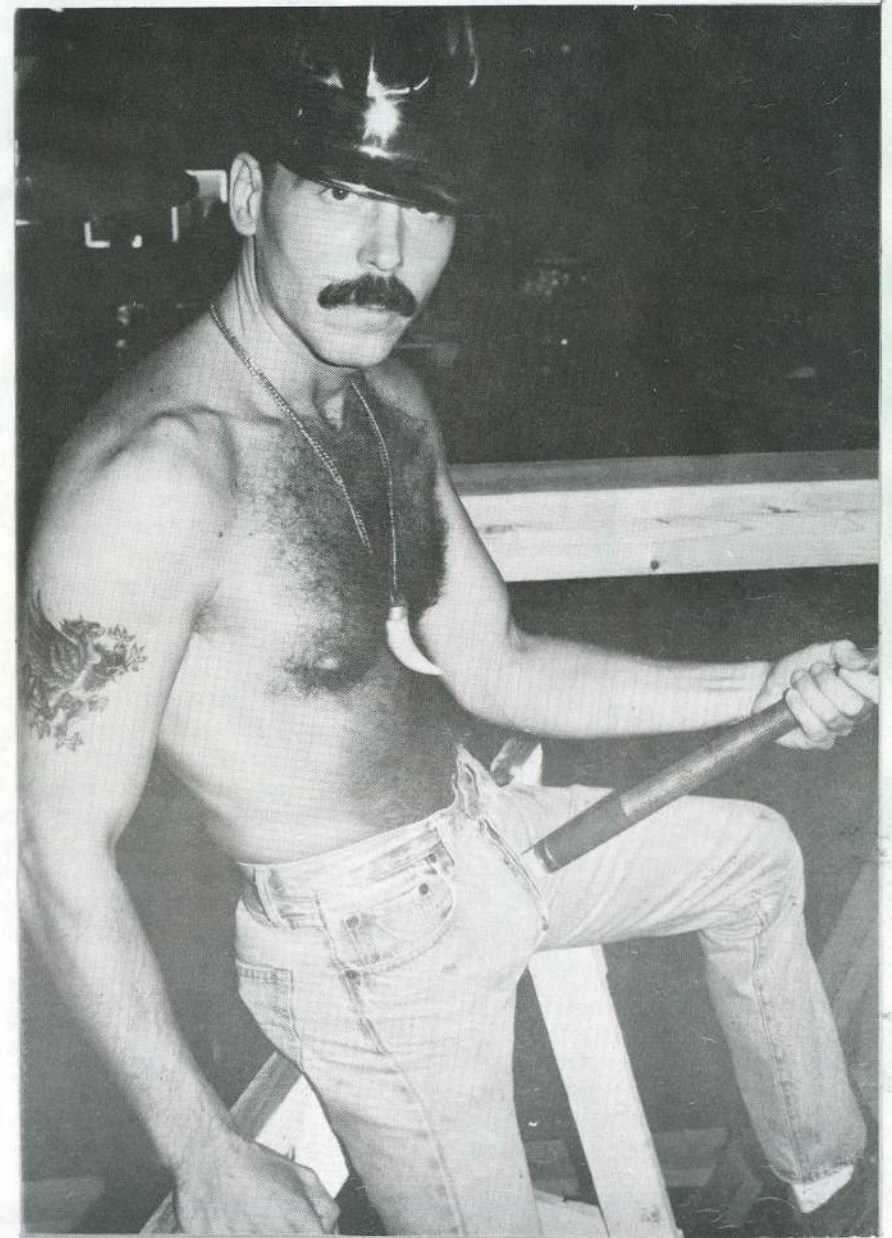
"my fantasy for cowboys." Leaving, endowed with a strong working knowledge of the Gay Bar Business, attuned to the world of leather, ... and macho.

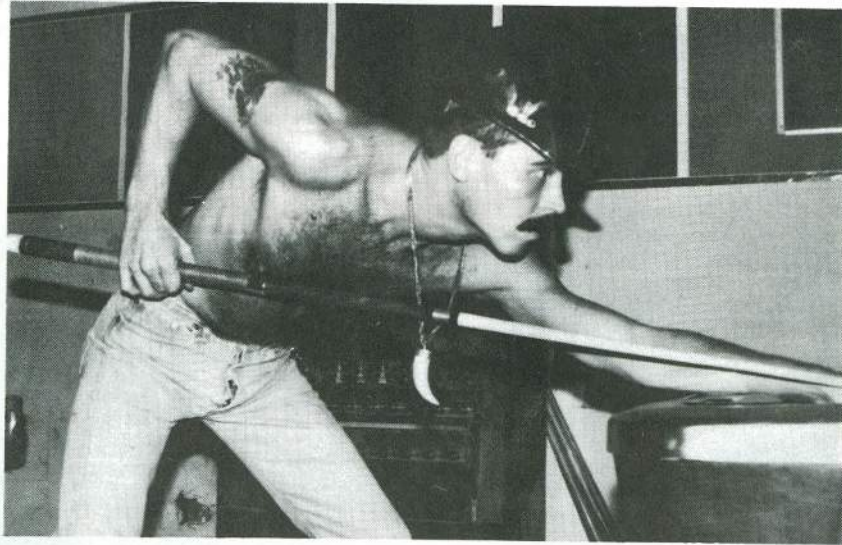
Where would you find that man. Where did he finally find himself ... what new worlds did he discover. Where would such a place indeed be.

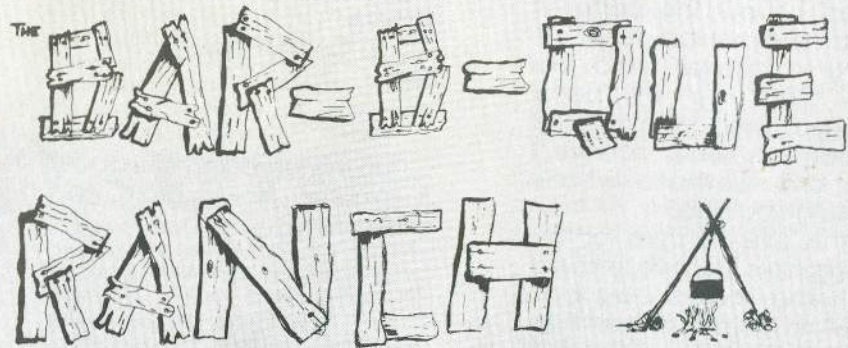

CONSTRUCTION DOES MAKE A DIFFERENCE

EDITORS NOTE—

Beginning this week Pegasus will feature in LIVING a new series of articles relating to our lifestyle. Our purpose is to help our readers to find ways to better their quality of life through enhancing their surroundings, improving and beautifying the space in which they live. By the use of the educational tips we come up with, our readers will be able to plan for their future, make wiser choices in purchases, choose more compatible career roles, and successfully budget their incomes to allow for proper and profitable investments, personal financial planning and programming. For the first of our series we drew upon the expert services of decorating consultants at Byman's Interiors. It was they that brought to our attention that there is a very real and dramatic difference between good, durable, longer-lasting and properly coordinated furnishings, and quickly-bought, poorly-planned furnishings on the other hand. Byman's tasteful showrooms will yield a wide range of examples in quality furniture, furnishings and accessories for the discriminating. In many cases, it costs no more to spend a little more upfront. You get better construction, better durability and better design. Over the long-haul that means tremendous savings for most of us.

Knowledge of what's underneath, the hidden features of construction in buying upholstered sofa's and chairs can easily make the difference in knowledgeable buying.

Repeatedly people come to us with tales of disappointment they had in purchasing furniture. The tales are usually the same. On the showroom floor the piece looks solid, fashionable, and capable of providing years of long-lasting and enjoyable wear and comfort. A mere few months later the same piece may look like a kindergarten class used it for their playground. The price tag wasn't that all too great a difference between a similar-appearing piece that we might have on our showroom floor. The difference was in the care and quality of workmanship that went into the construction.

All of the special features that go into the construction of say a sofa or a stuffed chair are obviously not immediately apparent. At least to the naked eye. One has to do a little investigation and ask a lot of questions. Paramount in importance is choosing a furniture dealer or designer with an established reputation for reputable quality. Not less in importance is your own personal feelings and tastes. If the house you are dealing with is indeed reputable they will realize this. You may be asked as many questions as you are prepared to ask them. Therefore come prepared to describe your existing furnishings, and particularly the pieces you plan to save or replace. A few measurements (like room size, dimensions of partitions, existing furnishings, etc.) are helpful. Floor coverings, wall-hangings, window treatments, incidentals and accessories should be noted. Living appliances such as T.V.s, stereo units, air-conditioners and the like should be kept in mind.

After you have settled on a piece which seems to be compatible and will fit your needs then it is up to you to investigate the integrity of the construction of the piece in question. Below is a handy check list of points in construction you should ask about. If the dealer or designer doesn't volunteer this information (remember a good one usually will)—then it's up to you to do the asking.

LIVING

1. **Constructional Integrity** starts with the frame. The best frame is made out of heavy stock such as kiln-dried hardwoods (Maple is a good popular material) that has been shaped to naturally follow the contours or outline of the furniture design.

2. **Joints:** Many cheaper constructed pieces are simply tacked or nailed together. They easily fall apart. Better constructed furniture will be reinforced with corner blocks, glued or screwed (or both) to the frame.

3. **Snugly fitted double dwelled (not grooved) joints** make for lasting rigidity.

4. **Firm arm contours** are best achieved in better pieces by rounding of the edges a small degree.

5. Where and if pieces have projecting corners (or wrap) on the cushions, special inserted springs should be present to add extra support and avoid sag.

6. **Springs** should be tied and interlaced by hand in at least 8 different directions with flax tie-twine or equivalent.

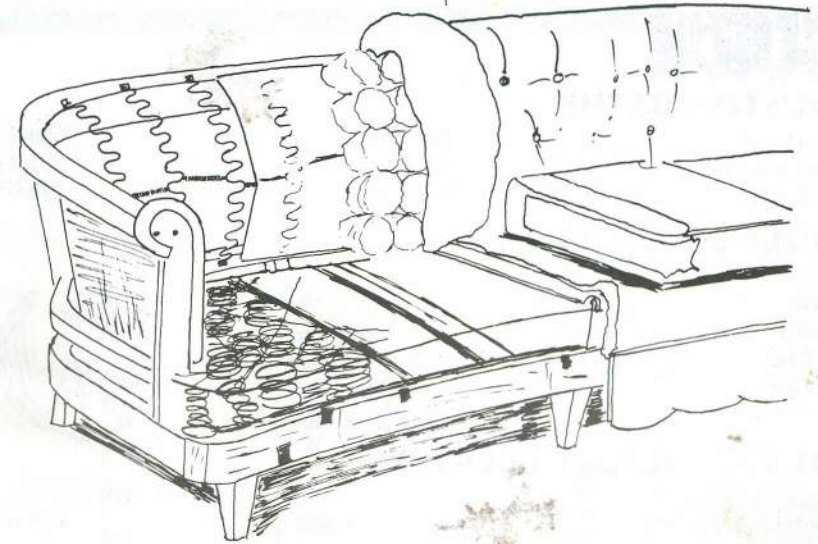
7. **Steel rod bottom supports** attached to the frame and to the spring assembly provides steadiness and extra resilience.

8. In most cases manufacturing standards listed on better grade furniture proudly list such things as UL (United Laboratories) fire safety, codes, etc., including non-absorbent, odor-free spring covers.

9. The layering of high-grade (closely compacted cotton or synthetic felt) is easy to detect simply by picking up the seat cushions and pressing on the bare spring.

10. A roll of polythene or similar material along the outward edges will be detected by the firm, hand to the feel seat edge.

11. **Cushions** should be firm (not squishy). While Mr. Whipple might not approve, firmness here is easy to detect.



12. Under the poly propylene covering of the chair (reach underneath and you'll feel it), most good quality pieces will be reinforced with steel bands.

13. Steel rods will usually also be detected between the rows of springs.

14. The web-base (the covering under the piece) should be made out of a durable material such as polypropylene.

15. If there is skirting around the bases, there will be a firmness to them. They should hang straight.

16-17-18. High grade white cotton felt for fabric base, muslin innerliner and then polyester fiber-filler provides the backing.

19. A second under-layer of high grade white cotton felt might come next.

20. Then—the springs. A "marshall unit" of encased in muslin individually wrapped steel coil springs.

21. Poly-propylene cover provides a cushion for the according-like backing springs.

22. No sag springs must provide the resilience you need to give the durability to the back.

23. Poly propylene covering the inside of the arms.

REVIEW

A Day and a Night at the Baths

A Day and a Night at the Baths, first of all, is **not** pornography. If you let Aunt Jane get ahold of it she might think so. Her and the Women's Missionary Group over at the Shalock Baptist Temple.

It is lusty. Some of the passages are descriptive. Sometimes there are lapses into cutesy camp. It **does** deal with the sexual mystique of a subject that is a peculiar phenomena of the Gay counter-culture—explicitly and exactly.

But there is more to the Baths of Rumaker's experience than just the sacred shrine of the orgy room. **A Day and a Night** deals with emotional needs, feelings, fantasies, as well as rational and irrational responses to basic wholesome human sexuality.

Baths is like a guide-book into this world of sexual opportunity—transcending far beyond raw promiscuity—Alan Ginsberg called it a monograph ... something that straight men can read if they wonder what goes on in the baths.

Baths should probably be added to any required reading of those enrolled in a Gay Studies Class. It is an honest above-board account of what "those" places are like and what goes on there. For that reason it achieves an "A" in educational literature. For those who are already educated, it makes plain good entertaining reading.

Dr. Crosby points out that taking iron without medical supervision can be dangerous to your health, for the following reason. Only one mg. of iron is needed daily, a very small amount, available in any average diet. In fact the body is protected from ordinarily absorbing more than one mg. by its own intestinal barrier. Otherwise we would all soon be overloaded with iron. Unfortunately some people are not well protected and even on regular diets develop an iron overloaded body, a disease call hemochromatosis (he-moh-chrom-ah-toe'-sis).
