With the need for a replacement for Felix's leadership, I have volunteered to serve as Co-Chair with Anabel. I do this for two reasons. First, we are already in the month of March and the Co-Chair needs to have a working relationship with the existing Executive Team.

My second reason is somewhat personal. I have for many years

on KPFT and as keeper of the mailing list for MAC and the Texas Human Rights Foundation.

Each one of those tasks took a lot of time and effort. The Newsletter was developed from a small photocopied sheet of a circulation of 50 to a 12-page monthly publication with a circulation of 2000. This newsletter continued until the MAC Board decided to refocus its energies solely to the creation of a community center.

The mailing list also started with 50 names kept on an Apple IIc computer. Today it contains more than 10,000 names throughout the country. In fact the list actually has many more names, but because of the constant updating and cleaning it stays at 10,000. I update the list almost on a daily basis and every group that uses it does postage returns at least four times a year. Recently the list was submitted to the post office for the additions of the Zip + 4 and carrier route information. This will enable our organizations to save money and get their word out faster. I proudly say that the list that I keep is the most up to date and accurate of any organization in our community.

I have been very happy doing this background work in the community. However this community does not have enough people involved both in leadership and general volunteer roles.

So because of this need I have placed my name in for nomination of Co-Chair. I have been appointed temporary Co-Chair until the meeting on March 19.

I have always been more comfortable in the background rather than going to the many social events in the community.

I am basically a shy person who can get behind a computer terminal or a microphone.

But what we are trying to do in this organization is so important

that I am going to try to deal with my uncomfortableness.

Pride Week stands for everyone who has had that feeling when they were young or not so young that they were the only one who had feelings for their own sex.

There is still a feeling among many of us that we have to hide. We sometimes hide at work, we sometimes hide from our family, we sometimes hide from our friends.

I am not pointing the finger at anyone. I sometimes hide and am not honest about myself in certain situations.

Each one of us can be open about who we are to different degrees. But together, and together with the things Pride Week does, we become stronger individually and collectively.

On Saturday, February 23, we did a photo shoot for the TAKE PRIDE poster. The idea behind the poster is to show the diversity of our community and the fact that many of us can say that we are proud to be Gay and Lesbian.

Many of the Executive Team spent the afternoon there. It was an incredible experience. We have couples, friends, men, women, people of color, people with their pets and the list goes on and on. Altogether we had over 50 people from our community who felt proud to be a member of our community.

I have been involved in the Gay and Lesbian community in Houston since 1982, but there is something special about Pride Week.

Pride Week is an organization to help all the other organizations to do events, to march in the parade and, most importantly to say "Yes, Dorothy there is no place like home." And we in the Gay and Lesbian community are a family of friends and lovers.

But I am not Pride Week alone. I am only one person. The Executive Committee and I need your help. Get involved. Come to the meeting on March 18. We need help in all areas of Pride Week. λ

Publications - Bob Alban announced the next committee meeting for Feb. 25th at 7:30 PM. his place; commented on the creative side of the Guide; the commission on ad sales was ratified; anyone interested in selling ads contact Bob or Felix; received one bid from Bar Wilson but his terms are not in keep-

ing with contract as agreed by the Executive Team; a master list of ad sales is available; an article by Karla Bradley that appeared in last year's Guide has been re-published.

Fundraising - Felix read a faxed copy of Wayne Grabein's Committee report (See attached).

Marketing - Bobby Miller informed the group about the upcoming Photo Shoot at Rich's on Saturday, Feb. 23rd from 1-5 PM.; a question from the floor addressed the selection process of the photos to be used for the poster; Bobby replied that the decision would be first by the photographer, second by the Executive Team and lastly by the general membership. Bids for additional items to be ordered will be received; distributors for merchandise for such items as koozies and other items will be addressed. Tshirts are available; the next committee meeting will be on March 7th at Bobby's; Bobby has recruited Brian Keever to Co-Chair the committee.

Logistics - Felix reported for Mike Alfaro; the parade entry form along with the cover letter & event listing form will be included in the next newletter and should be printed by the end of the week; a \$10 fee for the event listing will be asked of organizations; comp. tickets will be requested for the Executive Team.

Media - Jack Valinski announced that 700 newsletters were printed for Feb. and were mailed out to organizations; some newsletters were placed at the TWT Office, Inklings and other locations. The resource Guide will be included in the next issue; press releases are being prepared for events such as the Photo Shoot and the Parade route; radio shows are planned for March 11 & 15th at KPFT; this Saturday is the deadline for the next newsletter.

Parade - Felix Garcia reported on information pertaining to a permit from the city for the parade; bleachers will be considered for this year's parade; Greg Scott has provided "mock-ups" of the billboard poster; the parade entry form will be finalized and made available soon. Felix opened the floor for nominations for Grand Marshal and Honorary Grand Marshal. (Nomination applications were submitted for the record).

Nominations for Grand Marshal were taken from the floor: Linda Morales, the Lone Star Symphonic Band, Larry Lingle, Jack Jackson, Gene Harrington and Thad Coverdale. Nominations for Honorary Grand Marshal were also accepted as follows: Katy Caldwell and Marvin Davis (aka Lady Victoria Lust). Voting will take place at the next General Meeting on March 19th.

Cathy Lenahan was appointed to look into an "award" for the Lone Star Symphonic Band. She will report her findings at the next meeting.

A motion was made to have the same person that read the nomination application return for the next meeting; it was seconded and the motion passed.

Felix closed the nomination process.

Strategy Session Summary - Felix commented on the accomplishments of the Executive Team retreat held January 26th; a summary of the session was prepared by Brad Veloz, Secretary and submitted to Felix as part of the record.

Outreach efforts - Anabel has been in contact with organizations to solicit interest in Pride Week; she attended Miss Camp's meeting and informed the group about "March Awareness Month" which will kick-off March 1st at Gentry's; other KPFT interviews are scheduled; she is also working on the article "Where Are The Women" for the next Pride Week newsletter; she hopes to continue networking with women's organizations to encourage meeting attendance.

The Pink Triangle

Much of Gay and Lesbian history
— so long suppressed by fear and
bigotry—is only now coming to light.

A particularly grim part of our history is the pink triangle.

Though it is seldom, if ever, mentioned in accounts of the Nazi era, the fact is the untold thousands of actual and suspected homosexuals were confined and murdered in Hitler's Germany - less than 40 years ago.

A pink triangle on the clothing on the left side of the jacket and on the right trouser—was the required emblem to denote homosexual status in the Nazi prison camps.

The present day American Gay and Lesbian movement only began to become aware of the horrifying truth in the early 1970s, when some Gay Liberation scholars began unearthing and publishing it.

In recognition of such inhumanity and out of determination that it should not happen again, the pink triangle button is coming to be worn by American Lesbians and Gay men from coast to coast.

How many homosexuals died? The number whom the Nazis killed will never be known for sure. Figures on the number actually brought to trial on criminal anti-Gay charges do exist, but many were interned in camps without trial, and many others were shot by firing squad, especially in the military. More over, the records of several concentration camps were destroyed when Germany was on the verge of defeat.

In the formal court system alone, over 46,000 Germans were convicted of homosexuality between 1933 and the first part of 1943. Figures for the rest of 1943, 1944 and 1945 are unknown. Confinement without trial became more common in the later Nazi years.

In addition, homosexuals from Nazi-occupied countries besides Germany were also confined.

An estimate of 220,000 homo-

sexuals killed by the Nazis is attributed to Austrian Protestant sources—this would not include the normal percentage of unrecognized homosexuals among other persecuted groups.

How did it happen? Not only was homosexual intercourse a crime in Nazi Germany, so were kisses, embraces, even homosexual fantasies. The researcher Jim Steakley writes: "One man, for instance, was successfully prosecuted on the grounds that he had observed a couple making love in a park and watched only the man."

After the war, homosexuality continued to be a crime in West Germany. As a result, not only were Gay concentration camp survivors excluded from the reparations paid by the postwar German government to other victims of the Nazis, but few survivors were willing to tell of their experiences.

An estimate 220,000 gays were killed by the Nazis

Some accounts do exist, though. According to one, "The homosexuals were grouped into liquidation commandos and placed under triple camp discipline. That meant less food, more work, stricter supervision. If a prisoner with a pink triangle became sick, it spelled his doom. Admission to the clinic was forbidden."

The Nazi persecution of homosexuals was in part related to Nazi racial theories. Accordingly, a race of Aryan Ubermenschen could not tolerate degenerate breeding stock. Besides, the relatively advanced pre-Nazi Germany Gay movement was seen as a sign of the free society which Nazism wanted to stamp out in the name of conservative law and order.

Finally, one of Hitler's own rivals, Ernst Rohm, was homosexual, and when in 1934 Hitler had him murdered, he used Rohm's Gayness as an excuse. λ
