Racism in the Lesbian and Gay Community

ur larger society has a great amount of racism within it, and the gay and lesbian community being part of the larger society has its share of bigotry. Even though we are a minority, we don't always know better about other minorities.

Many of our gay and lesbian organizations do attempt to represent our community at large; however, they are mostly white and male in membership and especially in leadership. Some have made sincere attempts to reach out to the minority communities. This does, at times, seem to be tokenism. The few women and even fewer people of color who are active in organizations are so overburdened to represent their parts of the community that they burn out quickly.

Organizations dealing with AIDS have an even more essential job of being representative. This is because the AIDS epidemic is going beyond the gay community to other minority populations. These organizations must do their best to get representatives from the communities that are becoming more at risk of contracting AIDS. Yet this is a lesson the Greater Houston-Harris County AIDS Task Force has yet to learn concerning the gay community.

How do we change? First, like any problem, we must admit that racism exists in our community. Admit that there are forms of racism that we cannot see, the subtle and often unconscious response of socialization. Challenging and changing the system is probably as hard as changing our homophobic and sexist system. As a people we fear difference and are comfortable with sameness. As many of us have pledged ourselves to this movement as a lifelong endeavor, we must do the same in tackling racism and sexism.

A new book called, Resisting Racism: An Action Guide available from NABWMT Publications, PO Box 408641, Chicago, IL 60640 or 1-800-NA4-BWMT, is a good start in offering suggestions on change. This change is both on a institutional and individual level. There are examples of workshops that could be a first effort.

As we face so many issues within ourselves and the community we realize we cannot cancel all of society's problems at once. We must choose the battles wisely without loosing sight of the greater picture. And we must not put off the difficult issues of reaching out to women and people of color because it is a challenging issue.

As in choosing "politically correct" products to purchase in our daily life, we can see that many issues are in conflict. One product may be right on the pro-choice issue yet may be wrong on the environmental issue. And we may not agree on the same issues.

We must work towards coalition with other minorities even though we may not be welcome because of our sexual orientation. As some members of our community may feel that our issues are not their issues, we could be confronted that issues of the minority communities are not the same as gay and lesbian issues.

But if society is going to change for us all, we must see racism not as an isolated problem. If we find that one of our bars discriminates by asking for two or three forms of identification for blacks or browns, while not asking the same for whites, it's everyone's problem.

We cannot move forward as a community when part of our community is being discriminated against and excluded from within. \(\lambda\)

Call to Order, Welcome, and Notice of Meeting

Co-Chair Jack Valinski called the meeting to order at approximately 7:10 PM.

Agenda and Minutes

Brian moved that the HL/GPW's January General Meeting Minutes and December General Meeting Minutes be approved. Marvin seconded. Motion carried.

Jack Valinski stated the current recording secretary has not attended the last two meetings. Repeated efforts have been made to contact her by telephone. The Co-Chairs have sent her a letter requesting her formal written resignation. She has not responded.

Treasurer's Report

Committee Reports

Brian also stated that HL/GPW will host a booth at Splash Day in Austin scheduled for May 3, 1992.

Fundraising — Co-Chair Wane Grabein announced upcoming HL/GPW fundraising events: Pre-Mardi Gras Pride Night, World's biggest Garage Sale, Bake Sale, Car Wash, Beach Party and a "What's It Worth?" auction. Dean Wadlradt requested that members donate items for the garage sale, bake sale, and auction. Additionally, he requested that members volunteer to staff these events.

Events — Chair Marla Alzenshtat reported that bids have been obtained to print HL/GPW's Pocket Guide and Informational posters.

Jack Valinski reported that 272 informational packets were mailed to local businesses and organizations promoting HL/GPW.

Parade — Lady Victoria Lust reported that the Parade Committee has been negotiating agreements with various vendors and distributing parade applications to all businesses and organizations. He requested members aid in locating additional parade participants.

Parade Committee Co-chair Daryl McDearman requested that members report additional businesses or organizations to distribute informational packets to.

Daryl also reported that insurance agencies are reluctant to give quotes for HLGPW's parade until occurrence of the event is within sixty days.



Jack reported that the non-profit 501(c)(3) has been resubmitted.



Q-Patrol to participate in HPD "Citizens On Patrol" program

Members of Q-Patrol are now participating in the Houston Police Department program called Citizens On Patrol, or C.O.P., for short. Initial training took place on February 20th, but the training will be an ongoing project as new members join the patrol. Certification classes last about two hours. Members are instructed on what to look for and listen for, when to call the police, and how to stay out of danger while on patrol. By participating in this program, HPD will furnish the Q-Patrol C.O.P. with magnetic signs and CB radios for the patrol vehicles, and will offer free training and re-training for all QP-COP members.

Officially, this new program will divide the Q-Patrol into two groups: The Q-Patrol COP, and the Q-Patrol Foot Patrol. Since the HPD program does not allow for foot patrols, our foot patrol program will operate on their own, while maintaining communication with the mobile units in the COP program. In prior months Q-Patrol has operated 1 to 3 mobile units and 1 to 2 foot patrols. With the new program in place, we hope to increase the

mobile patrol to 3 to 6 units while maintaining one foot patrol unit. Mobile units can cover a large area very rapidly, and can respond quickly. Foot patrol units are in place to see and hear more activity-sometimes foot patrol units become the target of verbal assaults, and the mobile patrol then takes over by following the vehicle, getting any additional information, such as license number, make, model, color, description of occupants, number of occupants, etc. Look for our "Q-Patrol" signs on patrol vehicles beginning the first part of March, or possibly sooner!

PINK SLIPS ARE IN THE MAIL!

Since Q-Patrol began, back around Thanksgiving 1991, we have been collecting and recording data gathered on suspicious vehicles, and those punks that choose to assault members of our community, both physically and verbally. We are now mailing a little pink postcard to the owner of the vehicle (probably mom

or dad!), in hopes of informing parents what their little darlings are up to. The postcard reads:

Please be advised that the vehicle described below has been seen in the Montrose night-club area. In an effort to stop HATE CRIMES that are routinely committed against gay men and lesbians in this area, we have taken to the streets, recording the license number and description of vehicles which are being driven through the area with no apparent destination, or whose occupants have been observed yelling at or throwing things at people walking through this area. We maintain a database with this information, and share the information with city, county, and federal law enforcement officials who are monitoring the hate crime situation here in Houston. Being logged into our database in no way implicates involvement in any crime or mischief. We simply want people to understand that gay-bashing is no longer a "sport" in Houston. If this vehicle belongs to your son or daughter, we strongly recommend that you have a talk with him or her before this situation becomes a problem.

We think these little cards will go a long way toward keeping undesirables out of OUR neighborhood!

Resisting Racism

S YOUR ORGANIZATION OR business attempting to confront the institutionalized racism that comes from being part of a society that encourages a "melting pot" mentality rather than one that promotes cultural diversity?

Are you as an individual trying to "resist racism" and work for real change?

Well, there are numerous books on racism available, but one in particular takes an action-oriented, and gay/lesbian-positive, approach to racism.

Resisting Racism: An Action Guide, published by the National Association of Black and White Men Together, is now available in a revised second edition, available through NABWMT's national office, based in Chicago since Jan. 1.

Edited by Gerald L. Mallon, a formal national co-chair of NABWMT who passed away late last year, *Resisting Racism* is a157-page manual divided into four basic sections: workshop outlines,

resource materials, essays, and bibliographies.

"Racism has grown resourceful in the last 20 years," writes Charles Stewart in his foreword to the manual. "As assaults have been made on its more overt manifestations, both personal and institutional, it has waxed subtle and tough, wily and elusive, almost chameleon in its ability to assume the guises of issues and causes."

"In the gay/lesbian community, it continues to thrive, in new and old forms. Indeed it is, in some of its subtler incarnations, again becoming respectable. And the gay/lesbian community is proving to be an exceptionally hospitable environment for the breeding of racism in the absence of any opposition," Stewart said.

"If you are under the false impression that racism no longer exists, or that it doesn't exist as a factor in your life," writes Dr. Mallon is his introduction to *Resisting Racism*, "I must point out to you that this evil continues to be interwoven into the very fabric of our society and our lives... Yes, instead of celebrating the strength

that ethnic and racial diversity can bring to the human condition, we continue to use it to separate us and to condemn and subjugate those who look different or have customs different from our own."

"Racism is affecting all of us in the most brutal of ways," Mallon says. "It's killing us. It's killing our spirits; it's killing our dreams, and it's killing our bodies. To ignore this reality or to lay the responsibility for action on someone else, perpetuates its existence. We must not attempt to ignore it, but rather we must do all in our power to resist it and confront it now!"

Essays

The essays section of *Resisting Racism* features the opinions of a variety of men and women, talking personally and professionally about racism in the gay and mainstream communities. Some of the essays were written in the early 1980s, while others are more current. Many appeared in other publications or were specches given at various conferences.

▼ Charles Stewart, in "The Culture of Norms", writes that: "Generally, as members of the

dominant culture, whites tend to be unaware that their perspective in these areas are culture related; they are apt to believe that they are value-free, objectively verifiable and self-evident, a notion rejected by the Black anti-culture."

▼ "America's original Sin and the Legacy of White Racism," an essay by Jim Wallis, looks at how the U.S. was established as a white society, "founded upon the genocide of another race and then the enslavement of another... It is the economy itself that now enforces the brutal oppression of racism and it happens, of course, invisibly and impersonally."

▼ Resisting Racism editor
Gerald Mallon, in his essay "Racism: The White Problem," notes
that: "The lesbian and gay community, itself an oppressed minority,
is not exempt from practicing racism. Racism in the gay community
can be seen in discriminatory bar
practices, labor practices, media
coverage, housing patterns, as well
as in many more subtle manifestations... It is imperative that white
individuals see racism for what it
truly is—a white problem." λ

A Quiz on Racism

The following quiz is from the "Institutional Racism: Fact and Fiction" workshop in Resisting Racism. It is from Understanding Institutional Racism, by the Racism and Sexism Resource Center for Educators. The purpose of the workshop is to "stimulate interest of workshop participants by presenting facts about institutional racism which often jar people's assumptions."

- 1. Black men with college diplomas earn more than white men with high school diplomas.
- 2. Twice as many Native American infants die during their first year than do other American infants.
- 3. Chicanos drop out of school at a rate four times that of Anglos, and one-fourth of Native American youths drop out by eighth grade.
- 4. In five Southwestern states, Chicanos are 17% of all pupils, 3% of all principals, 4% of all teachers, 5.6% of all students entering college and 28.2% of all school janitors.
- 5. In 1973, minority banks had less than 1% of the nation's bank assets, yet granted over 10% of all loans to minorities.
- 6. In 1958, median Black family income was 51% of median white family income. In 1970 it rose to 61%. In 1971 it dropped to 60%, in 1975, it was down to 56% of white median income, and in 1988 it was still 56% of white median income.
- 7. In 1988, 15% of all white children lived in families below the poverty line. The percentage for black children was double.




