A Mother's Reflection on Gay Pride

Sunday morning...June 28th... 10:30 a.m. Here I am, seated on a curb on Market Street in San Francisco surrounded by balloons, lawn chairs, people in various stages of dress and undress, and rainbow flags waving in the breeze. This was the event I had both looked forward to and feared since February when my son announced that my birthday present was a trip to California to march in the Gay Pride Parade. He said to be prepared to walk 1.5 miles with half a million people screaming at me. I admit to mixed emotions. "I'll be in San Francisco for Gay Pride week"; "What if I have to go to the bathroom"?; "I'll be able to walk proudly with my kids"; "I hate crowds, what if I have a major anxiety attack"? "I want to be able to see my Houston friends and walk with my own P-FLAG group"; "It will be only 70 degrees and there'll be no humidity"; "I'll take Valium"!

At 11:00 a.m. an unholy roar arose, the ground trembled, and there they were-The Women's Motorcycle Con-

Women in leather, spandex, lace, women with bare breasts, women with tattoos covering their bodies, women everywhere...what a sight...what a sound... the parade had begun. The theme banner went by - "A SIMPLE MATTER OF JUSTICE" - a quote from Harvey Milk stressing the necessity of legal protection for gays.

For the next two and a half hours I cheered and laughed at the floats and marchers as they passed. AIDS related floats; political groups; gay American Indians in tribal dress; gay Orientals (Queer Nasian); and the

National Leather Association. Men with bare butts cut out of their leather pants; Radical Faeries who walked on stilts and whose nude bodies were spray painted silver. The only group which was soundly booed and disparaged was NAMBLA, North American Man Boy Love Association, a controversial organization which advocates legalization of pedophilia.

At about 1:30 p.m. the crowd went wild. There was the P-FLAG banner held aloft by two proud parents, followed by a contingency of smiling, waving family units. This is what I had been waiting for - my opportunity to march in the San Francisco Gay Pride Parade. My son, his companion and I jumped in and started waving, while my daughter and her friends took pictures. It was so incredibly emotional walking along and seeing the tear stained faces of these beautiful men and women applauding and cheering us. My thoughts were for their parents who were missing out on this bonding experience. I have never felt closer to my children than during that walk. The first time I left the group and ran to the sidelines to hug someone, my son asked if I

knew the young man to whom I had reached out. When I said I didn't, the woman walking in front of us turned around and said, "don't you know, we're mothers to them all". I cried that afternoon, from beginning to end of the walk.

Each of my children is an individual with special qualities and I love them all equally. Seeing my beautiful youngest daughter walk down the aisle at her wedding was such a proud and joyous moment; listening to my second son talk about his impending engagement and his life in Louisiana is special; looking forward to grandchildren is a definite highlight in my life; but to be able to share in this part of my gay children's lives was incredible.

My heart goes out to parents everywhere who are denying their children's sexuality and living empty lives because they cannot accept the diversity and utter normalcy of their own flesh and blood. To these brave, wonderful men and women, my message is one I wrote on the signature panel of the AIDS quilt - "I celebrate your uniqueness. You are all my children"! λ

The Films

VITO RUSSO'S TEN BEST AND FIVE WORST GAY MOVIES

Vito Russo is the author of The Celluloid Closet: Homosexuality in the Movies. As a freelance journalist, he has had articles published in Rolling Stone, The Advocate, The Village Voice, and other national publications. He is a native New Yorker, and a cofounder of ACT-UP (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power).

When listing the "best" of anything it is advisable to cite one's criteria for selection. Are we judging art or politics? Must the best gay films qualify as good cinema as well as good politics? Are the worst gay films those which are homophobic regardless of their value as art? As a rule I have chosen to list those films which I think have illuminated diverse aspects of the gay and lesbian experience in an exciting, personal, or unusual way. In doing so, I found that those listed among the best were generally good films and those on the worst list were usually not.

I have avoided obscure or inaccessible titles. Most of the films
listed are available on videotape.
Because of space limitations, I was
forced to omit several worthy titles
which came to mind or were suggested to me by friends. What remains is, I think, a valid primer for
anyone wishing to sample the best
and the worst ways in which the
twentieth century's most popular
art form has reflected lesbians and
gay men.

THE BEST

ABUSE (1983), directed by Arthur J. Bressan, Jr. The story of a gay independent filmmaker and his relationship with a battered teenager. A daring and powerful exploration of the issues of child abuse and intergenerational sex.

LONGTIME COMPANION (1990), directed by Norman Rene. Originally shot for American Playhouse, this first feature film dealing with gay men and AIDS follows a group of friends through eight years in the epidemic. There's a lot

of casual affection between men, they don't pander to straight expectations, and the writing is naturalistic and real.

MAURICE (1987), directed by James Ivory. A little too "Masterpiece Theatre" for some tastes, but an effective adaptation of the Forster novel which explores, perhaps for the first time on screen, the fact that homosexuality is not a choice but a state of being.

MY BEAUTIFUL
LAUNDRETTE (1986), directed by
Stephen Frears. Pakistani playwright Hanif Kureishi's screenplay
explores class, race, and sex in
Thatcher's Britain. The central romantic relationship is quite
incidentallyand
charminglybetween two men.

PARTING GLANCES (1986), directed by Bill Sherwood. Superbly written, directed, and acted independent film about twentyfour hours in the lives of some gay New Yorkers in the age of AIDS.

SUNDAY BLOODY SUNDAY (1971), directed by John Schlesinger. Witty and literate original drama featuring a triangular relationship between Peter Finch, Murray Head, and Glenda Jackson. The first major film in which two men kissed on screen.

TAXI ZUM KLO (1980), directed by Frank Ripploh. Intensely personal, funny, and controversial independent German film about the sexually promiscuous lifestyle of a high school teacher.

THE TIMES OF HARVEY
MILK (1985), directed by Robert
Epstein. Powerful, Oscar-winning
documentary about the life of the
San Francisco city supervisor who
was assassinated along with Mayor
George Moscone in 1977. Also won
five Emmys and The New York
Film Critics Award for best documentary.

TONGUES UNTIED (1989), directed by Marlon Riggs. A dazzling piece of filmmaking about black gay men. Poetic, political, and angry, this powerful film is the first to shatter the silence about gay people of color in a powerful and entertaining way.

VICTIM (1961), directed by Basil Dearden. Landmark blackmail thriller starring Dirk Bogarde as a London barrister who risks his marriage and career to change the laws which made homosexuality a criminal offense.

THE WORST
BUSTING (1974), directed by
Peter Hyams. A slezoid look at the
world of the vice squad with an

emphasis on homosexual life in the ghetto.

CRUISING (1980), directed by William Friedkin. This murder mystery, based on Gerald Walker's homophobic novel, is set in New York's sex and S&M underground. Nasty, exploitative film which suggests that homosexuality can be acquired through contact.

PARTNERS (1982), directed by James Burrows. Ryan O'Neal and John Hurt, a straight and a gay police officer, pretend to live "as homosexuals" in order to trap a killer. Every Neanderthal stereotype in the book.

THE SERGEANT (1968), directed by John Flynn. Rod Steiger as the officer in love with handsome young John Philip Law. A textbook case of the tortured, self-hating homosexual who commits suicide after giving in to his unnatural desires. The film implicitly approves of suicide as a solution to homosexuality.

by Stanley Donen. Relentlessly grim portrait of two bitter, aging homosexual barbers facing a crisis when one is arrested for soliciting. The film and the play upon which it is based blame their misery not on their problems but on their sexuality.

ANDREA WEISS'S TEN BEST AND FIVE WORST LESBIAN MOVIES

Andrea Weiss won an Emmy Award for her research for the television documentary Before Stonewall. With Greta Schiller, she produced and directed the films International Sweethearts and Tiny and Ruby: Hell Divin' Women. Her articles have appeared in Ms., The Advocate, Cineaste, and other journals.

MADCHEN IN UNIFORM (1931), directed by Leontine Sagan. West Germany. Distributed by Films, Inc. The recent emergence of lesbian independent cinema doesn't offer anything that can hold a candle to this classic story of a sensitive, defiant schoolgirl's passion for her teacher.

ENTRE NOUS (1984), directed by Diane Kurys. France. Although the jury is still out on whether this is a "lesbian film," the relationship between Madeleine (Miou-Miou) and Lena (Isabelle Huppert) is passionate, intellectual, dependable, and sensual, and provides the crucial tension which propels the film.

DAMNED IF YOU DON'T (1987), directed by Su Friedrich.

United States. An experimental exploration of a nun's sexual desire which has been awakened by a beautiful stranger from outside of the convent.

I'VE HEARD THE MER-MAIDS SINGING (1987), directed by Patricia Rozema. Canada. A funny, absurdist comedy about a "person Friday" in an art gallery who falls in love with her curator; weak on plot line but more than compensates by its resourcefulness and ingenuity.

QUEEN CHRISTINA (1933), directed by Rouben Mamoulian. Screenplay by Salka Viertal. United States. Never mind that Queen Christina falls in love with the Spanish ambassador in the snow. Greta Garbo as Queen Christina will always be remembered by lesbian viewers for her masculine attire, her refusal to marry, and her love for Countess Ebba.

DESERT HEARTS (1986), directed by Donna Deitch. United States. A great lesbian Western, this independently produced feature is conventional Hollywood in style but uncompromised in its representation of lesbians.

THE VIRGIN MACHINE (1988), directed by Monika Treut. West Germany. An ironic initiation of a young, naive West German researcher into the lesbian sexual underground of San Francisco, beautifully shot by cinematographer Elfi Mikesch.

DAUGHTERS OF DARK-NESS (1970), directed by Harry Kumel. Belgium. Providing a feminist twist on the lesbian vampire genre, this film makes heterosexuality abnormal and violent, and offers a lesbian vampire (played by Delphine Seyrig) as its most sympathetic and likeable character. A "campy" lesbian classic.

17 ROOMS, OR WHAT DO LESBIANS DO IN BED? (1984), directed by Carolyn Sheldon. Great Britain. This ten-minute gem was banned from English television because the question it poses was considered too shocking, but it is the film's humorous answers which provide ironic commentary on voyeurism and lesbian sexuality.

THE GROUP (1966), directed by Sidney Lumet. United States. Based on the novel by Mary McCarthy. Perhaps the first Hollywood film to include an obviously lesbian character without exploitation and sensationalism. Candace Bergen plays the sophisticated,

well-tailored Lakey who, when gay-baited, coolly and proudly proclaims her "Sapphism."

THE WORST WAITING FOR THE

MOON (1987), directed by Jill Godmillow. United States. Although this film is a portrait of the world's most famous lesbian couple, Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas, it carefully avoids giving any sexual dimension to their lives or any intimacy to their interactions.

THE FOX (1968), directed by Mark Rydell. United States. The archetypal lesbian film in that it follows the bisexual triangle formula (man rescues woman from lesbian lover) and ends with the obligatory death of the lover as well. A straight man's wet dream.

MY TWO LOVES (1986), directed by Noel Black. ABC madefor-TV movie. United States. Written by Reginald Rose and Rita Mae Brown. Lynn Redgrave plays an aggressive, predatory lesbian, a la The Killing of Sister George, making her moves when her "prey," Mariette Hartley, is most vulnerable.

PERSONAL BEST (1982), directed by Robert Towne. United States. Lesbianism is an adolescent phase that Chris (Mariel Hemingway) passes through en route to a more mature relationship with a man. Three quotes: New York Times, "Undisguised voyeurism." New York Daily News, "According to this movie, lesbianism is something they catch in the locker room, like athlete's foot." Director's statement, "I like looking at [the athletes'] thighs. I adore them. I want to fuck the daylights out of them."

THE COLOR PURPLE (1985), directed by Steven Spielberg. United States. Spielberg isn't afraid of creatures from outer space, but a lesbian relationship is simply too threatening. His adaptation of Alice Walker's novel is classic Hollywood erasure of lesbian characters and themes (not to mention its objectionable treatment of race)

The Music

ADAM BLOCK'S FIVE HOMO NEGATIVE AND TEN PRO HOMO POP SONGS

Adam Block is a widely published San Francisco-based journalist, a columnist for the San Francisco Sentinel, and the pop music editor for The Advocate.

Growing up, listening to the radio, I heard all kinds of wonder and weirdness, freedom and delight pumping out of the local rock station. But in thousands of doomed romances, one subject never came up; homos and lesbians simply didn't exist. Nearly thirty years later the subject still makes the pop scene squeamish. Gay singers long believed that honesty would spell commercial suicide. Most still do. That fear has generally left it up to heteros to address the subject ... or to let it lie.

HOMO-NEGATIVE POP

Fact is that homophobic Lyrics are a lot rarer than pop homophobia. Gays inspired by the songs of Donna Summer or Bob Marley would discover the artists' intolerant fundamentalism only from interviews. Fans of Neil Young and the Beastie Boys read their bigoted bile in magazines, not on Iyric sheets. Metal morons like Sammy Hagar confined their queerbashing to crowd-pleasing cracks in concert. The vinyl evidence is only the iceberg's tip.

MONEY FOR NOTHING and LES BOYS by Dire Straits. Songwriter Mark Knopfler insisted that the line "That little faggot has his own jet airplane" represented the voice of a blue-collar bigot with whom he had no sympathy. Anyone who had heard his earlier smug affront, "Les Boys," knew better.

THE MESSAGE by Grandmaster Flash & The Furious Five. This rap classic bit the bigot's hand, but took time out to level disdain on gays, sneering about a "fag hag" and evoking a prison rape that turns a man into that most horrible of all creatures: a limp-wristed queen.

MACHO MAN by The Village People. Originally a gay-conceptnovelty (doing male drag to disco instead of female drag to showtunes, thereby portraying queers who would no longer live according to cherished stereotypes), crossover success sent the combo diving for their closets. With this song they celebrated the most moronic, narcissistic vision imaginable. Suddenly, the group became a eunuched family cartoon, neutering the spectre that had inspired them.

Reed. Of all the glitter gang, Reed was the only one to live openly with a male lover (even if it was a creature named Rachel), but this song marked his apostasy. It wasn't so much his marriage that

galledor the declaration, "I love women. I've always loved women" but his insistence that "We all love women. We have always loved women." I figure Reed had the right to disown his own gay past, but I draw the line at his claim that the rest of us are simply deluding ourselves ... until the right woman comes along.

ON ANY OTHER DAY by The Police. Sting offered a litany of disasters: "My wife just burned the scrambled eggs, my daughter ran away, my son just said he's gay; it's been a terrible day." I later he would singbackup on the infamous "Money For Nothing," and release a film where his band slagged homos. Some suggest that his tribute to the distinctly old-school homo Quentin Crisp, "An Englishman in New York," was calculated to clear his name.

PRO-HOMO POP

This list doesn't pretend to be definitive. Many will miss the noble, if little-heard, independents like Steve Grossman, Blackberri, Charlie Murphy, Tom Wilson, Romanovsky & Phillips, Michael Callen, or any of the women on Redwood or Olivia. And where are such gay pop wonders as Sylvester, Boy George, and Marc Almond? As for "Lola" by the Kinks, endlessly cited by critics as "everybody's favorite," I never thought that oldschool-homo sing-along about a seduction by a drag queen had anything to do with gay lib.

REBEL REBEL and QUEEN BITCH by David Bowie. A bitch with a boner, a boy on a tear: scary, sexy declarations of possibility as shameless as squealing tires and as hungry as true love.

THIS CHARMING MAN and DIAL A CLICHE by The Smiths. The great fey loner Morrissey's grandiose misery is illuminated by savage wit and erotic visions find the elegant outsider repeatedly betrayed by rough trade and still coming back for more. Boys flock to the vegan-celibate Morrissey with the same fervor their big brothers brought to Bowie.

SWIM TEAM by Phranc. The brush-cut lesbian emerged from L.A.'s punk scene as a tough but disarming folksinger who enjoys using the 'L' word. She won over young audiences when she opened for Husker Du and for The Smiths.

GLAD TO BE GAY and THE WEDDING by Tom Robinson. The first song, which he did with his band in 1978, was a black blast at

gay apathy masquerading as an anthem. The second, a solo piece done nine years later, is a venomous, brilliant account of attending his boyfriend's wedding.

JOHNNY ARE YOU
QUEER? by Josie Cotten. 'The Go
Go's passed on this blast of pure
pop which sweetly acknowledges
that there are girls in high school
who are confused by their gay boy-

friends. Radical whimsy with a heart.

THE ALTAR BOY AND
THE THIEF by Joan Baez. An astonishingly astute portrait of a 1970s gay bar, which climaxes with two youths dancing as Joan declares, "to me they will always remain: unclaimed, unchained, and unblamed—the altar boy and the

thief-grabbing a little relief."

Bravo.

SMALLTOWN BOY and WHY? by The Communards. This unglamorous trio laid down a propulsive disco rhythm as Jimi Sommerville's falsetto soared on. A tale of a gay boy kicked out of his home in the industrial north of England and a toe-tapper assaulting gay bashing and bigotry. The first gay socialist guerillas to top the dance charts.

I AM WHAT I AM by Gloria Gaynor. The lady who cut "Never Can Say Goodbye" and "I Will Survive" takes the climactic number from La Cage Aux Folles to the dance floor, and makes the coming-out anthem an endless celebration.

GIMME, GIMME, GIMME (A MAN AFTER MIDNIGHT) by Erasure. Andy Bell, the U.K. duo's brazen gay vocalist, turns Abba's confection into a glistening carrousel with rugged studs in the place of ponies.

CIRCLEJERK and I WANNA FUCK YOUR DAD by The Impotent Sea Snakes. The Tampa, Florida combo were on a tear when "13" wrote the lyrics to this unlikely LP. The music is generic speed/thrash, but the words are inspirational_like that of the boy so smitten with his girlfriend's pa that he rants, "I don't want your tits and cunt. Your fuckin' dad is all I want. I know your dad, he ain't no fol. He can't live without my love tool," and the paean to communal boy sex, which details a complex orgy, and then choruses, "Circle Jerk! Let's all: Circle Jerk! C'mon, c'mon and jack off with me. Whores cost money but friends are free!" are unparalleled in pop music's rocky relationship with queerdom. \(\lambda\)



t was 20 years ago next month that an elementary-school teacher named Jeanne Manford made history. She walked down a street in New York City carrying the sort of poster paper her students sometimes used for projects, except that printed on it were these words:

PARENTS of Gays UNITE in SUP-PORT for our CHILDREN

At her side during the Gay Pride march was her son, Morty, her golden boy, the one a teacher once told her would be a senator someday. When he was in high school he said he wanted to see a psychologist, and the psychologist called the Manfords in and told them that the golden boy was gay. But it never changed his mother's mind about his glow.

Morty's story, and his mother's, too, are contained in a new oral history of the gay rights struggle, "Making History," by Eric Marcus. The cheering thing about the book is how far we have come since the days when newspaper editors felt free to use "homo" in headlines.

The distressing thing is how far we have to go, not in the world alone, where homophobia remains one of the last acceptable bigotries, but in

our homes, where our children learn that the world is composed exclusively of love and sex between men and women. Even when Mom and Dad have gay friends and raised consciousness, there is too often a silence that surrounds other ways of life and love. And silence begets distance.

The distressing thing is how far we have to go, not in the world alone, where homophobia remains one of the last acceptable bigotries

Distance between parent and child is one of the saddest things in "Making History": the parents who try to commit their gay children to mental hospitals, the ones who erect a gravestone and send an obituary to the paper when they discover their daughter is a lesbian, or simply the ones who were told nothing because their children considered the truth untellable.

Greg Brock, a newspaperman, describes how he came out to his parents the day before he was to appear on Oprah's show. Thirty-five

years old and the man had never spoken to his mother and father of his central reality. "I was about to destroy my dad's life," he recalled.

Is this really what we want, to obsess about ear infections and reading readiness and then discover many years too late that we were either unaware or unaccepting of who our children were? To keen "What will I tell my friends?" when our kids try to talk about their lives?

In the same borough in which Morty Manford grew up and his mother taught, a Queens school board has rejected a curriculum that encourages respect for all families, including those headed by gay and lesbian parents. Consider that decision, not in terms of gay rights, but in terms of the children.

Given statistical estimates, the board is telling I out of 10 kids that the life they will eventually lead is not part of the human program. Among their students are surely boys and girls who will discover they are gay and who, from their earliest years, will have learned that there is something wrong with that, and therefore with them. Learned it from classmates, from teachers. Worst of all, from their own mothers and fathers.

Actually, it's probably the mothers and fathers who need that curricu-

lum most. All parents should be aware that when they mock or curse gay people, they may be mocking or cursing their own child.

All parents should know that when they consider this subject unspeakable, they may be forever alienating their own child and causing them all enormous pain. Paulette Goodman, president of the Federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, likens it to her experience as a Jew in occupied Paris. "I know what it's like to be in the closet," she recalled. "I know all too well." Between parent and gay child.

Jeanne Manford didn't want a closet. Her Morty was the same golden boy after she found out he was gay as he was before. She was with him at the Gay Pride march and with him in the gay rights movement.

And she was with him when he died a little more than a week ago of AIDS, almost 20 years to the day after she wrote her unconditional love on poster paper for all the world to see. She does not reproach herself. She loved and accepted her child the way he was. In a perfect world, this would be the definition of "parent" in the dictionary. The point is not what you'll tell your friends at the bridge table. It is what you'll tell yourself at the end. λ
